

In 2019, Max competed in the USASA (USA Snowboard and Free Ski Association) National Championships in North Tahoe, Colorado, placing second in his age group. In 2020, Max placed first (in his age group) in the USASA National Championships. Max was also invited to the Canada Snowboard Air Nation Freestyle Tour 2022 in Calgary, Alberta— where the best athletes from around the world compete in slopestyle, big air, and half pipe competitions.

Max loves his school, Pinetree Way Elementary. Mr. Leonard, the school principal, and his teachers, Ms. Biscaro and Ms. Doyle, make him feel "just like at home". When Max found out that Coquitlam was situated close to the mountains, he told his family that he wanted to move there to study in SD43. 4. The Heritage Woods Science Co-op 11 class is a cohort of students who all have a passion for science exploration. The class covers Chemistry 11, Life Science 11, Work Experience 12, and outdoor PE 11 in heavy detail. The class constantly looks for new and exciting opportunities that promote different science careers and pathways.

AME Roundup is an event for professionals in the minerals and mining industries. Typically, students across the province are invited to AME Roundup Career Exploration Day via MineralsEd – an educational group that focuses on helping educators and students explore this career and education field. However, due to the size and nature of the class, students were invited to join during the regular convention days.

On January 31, the science co-op students attended the AME Roundup event and were challenged to network and meet some of the different companies that had a booth at the conference. This included specialists in drone technology, minerals extraction, exploration companies, universities, and more. The students were given a variety of tasks, which included finding out information about products, career pathways, educational pathways, and more. The group also met with Yukon Dan, a gold panning specialist, who shared with students where to find gold, how to gold pan, and different facts about gold.

5. Gleneagle Secondary School's STEAM TEAM, students from ConX Leadership, hosted a virtual workshop for staff during the Focus Day on January 31<sup>st</sup>. The team demonstrated activities with the objective of promoting STEAM education to local middle school educators, in hopes they'd then share with their students. The team shared their personal experiences, as well as advocated their plans for their STEAM convention this coming May at Moody Middle School.



6. Ms. Leslie's Social Studies 9 class from École Dr. Charles Best Secondary School caught the attention of Drex from JACK FM. On-air, Ms. Leslie explains how 15 of her Socials 9 students have written letters to the municipalities of Port Moody and Coquitlam requesting that they consider changing the name of Dewdney Trunk Road.

This student activism was prompted by in-class discussion of the Indian Act and the role Edgar Dewdney played in the institution of Residential Schools in Canada and displacement of Indigenous and Metis people to make way for the CPR.
