

Regular Board Meeting of May 11, 2021

On May 3rd- 7th, <u>Dr. Charles Best Secondary School and Port Moody Secondary School students collected and displayed 40 red dresses on trees in honour of the Missing & Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls in Canada (MMIWG).</u> The students have been studying the issue of MMIWG and hopes these actions will help raise awareness and urge politicians to take more action on the inquiries. They were also featured on <u>Global News here</u>.

The Red Dress Project was created in 2010 by Jaime Black, a Métis artist whose public art installation was created in response to the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women (MMIWG) in Canada and the United States.

A big Congratulations to Gleneagle student *Rowan Zawadzki* who won the *Schulich Leader Scholarship 2021* in recognition of his outstanding achievements in academics and leadership valued at \$100,000. Rowan will start his studies in the Fall at the University of British Columbia.

Rowan created from scratch 'Milton' The Robot 2019, a multi-jointed robotic arm capable of facial recognition. He also found time to develop a computer programming course aiming at inspiring younger students to pursue a career in STEM, at his high school.



He has a passion for emerging engineering fields (such as robotics, coding, drones) and has already participated in a project modifying an *RC Car + Drone that can Almost Fly in 2020*. Watch this <u>video</u> to see the amazing work that Rowan put in.

In ten years, Rowan sees himself founding a startup company that researches and develops technological solutions that make the world a better place.


Grade 6 and 7 teacher organizer, Tiana Chan, shares on TriCity News, "I'm doing my master's and thought that
