## Celebrating Earth Day with the Districts Earth Day Eco-Week Challenge (April $17 - 24^{th}$ )

Earth Day is one of the most important days of the year. We hope our schools will take the opportunity to take some time to ensure students recognize the importance of sustaining our environment.





## **Earth Day Eco-Week Overview**

Eco-Week Dates: April 17<sup>th</sup> – 20<sup>th</sup> (the week leading up to Earth Day, which is Saturday, April 22<sup>nd</sup>).

### **How to Participate:**

Form a Team and select a Team Captain.

- A team can be comprised of an entire school, class, club, or group of friends. Teams require a minimum of 10 people.
- The team captain will be responsible for the coordination and submitting proof of participation (this can be a teacher or student).
- 2. If you haven't already done so, register your team for the Eco-Week Challenge before **April 12**<sup>th</sup>, **2023**, by scanning the QR code above or <u>clicking here</u>.
- 3. Participate in the daily activities listed below for a chance to win prizes!

## City Nature Challenge

The City of Coquitlam, Port Coquitlam, and Port Moody are teaming up to participate in this year's City Nature Challenge and we're inviting your school to get involved!

What is a City Nature Challenge? It's a global initiative in which cities all over the world compete to get the most citizen scientists to participate in local flora and fauna identification using the "iNaturalist" app. <u>Here</u> is a link with more information.

The challenge runs from April 28 – May 1, but preparation and practice using the app are highly encouraged beforehand.

To encourage staff and students to participate, you may consider doing a private challenge in your school to see which class can get the most observations! All entries will still count towards the greater challenge so long as observations are taken within city boundaries.

Please share these resources with your staff to make the experience run smoothly and more enjoyable. Here is a <u>teacher's guide</u> to using iNaturalist as well as an <u>Education Toolkit</u> with helpful tips for successful participation. Some highlights include:

- Uploading all student photos from the teachers' accounts to ensure quality data entries
- Using the Seek app instead for our younger/beginner citizen scientists
- Cultivated Organisms vs Wild Organisms

# School Bike Programs for Grades 4-7 and Bike-to-school week, May 29-June 2. (All School Levels)

Local municipalities have confirmed funding for approximately 10-13 more elementary schools to participate in a fully funded <u>Learn2Ride course</u> in 2023. Additionally, our provincial <u>Everyone Rides Grade 4-5</u> <u>program</u> is funding 3-4 more Learn2Ride courses in SD43 this coming spring.

### BIKE TO SCHOOL COURSES

Providing fully-funded bike skills and instruction for Gr 4-7students. Our trained instructors show up at your school with a fleet 🧓 of bikes so that all students can participate in either of our two programs:

#### Learn2Ride

An introductory course for Gr 4-5 covering basic road rules in the classroom portion (1hr) and then safe cycling skills in the mocked-up scenarios we build on school grounds (1.5hr).

#### Ride The Road

Targeted to Gr 6-7, this course takes place over 4-5 days, and explores basic bike maintenance and cycling safety. The last session includes a 30-45 min road ride in your neighbourhood where no more than 6 students ride with each instructor.
