English 11 is about using the English language to its best effect in both fiction and non-fiction writing. This course will help you explore how various authors have created stories that carry readers to another place and time, and how others make arguments clear and compelling. Reading and writing exercises will also challenge you to become more critical in how you make the English language your own.

Working Online:

Our primary learning environment will be in an online environment. In the online environment, the student will find lessons, assignments, discussion boards, calendars, Elluminate and other tools that will be used to help learn the outcomes of the course and demonstrate understanding. The course is designed to allow for flexibility along with an opportunity to be successful. Many students find that being an independent and autonomous learner is difficult and takes dedication. However, by the time online course is completed, many students report feeling better prepared for future learning challenges. Our program has expectations around 'active participation'; students should plan to work on assignments at a regular pace (on average 1-2 hours per day for each class) and hand in a minimum of one assignment per week (more will be required to complete the course in a one semester timeline).
