## Secondary School Apprenticeship (Work in Trades)

Designed for high school students who have, or are seeking, full or part time paid employment in one of the 100+ apprenticeable trades (see ITABC,ca)

Earn up to 16 credits ( 4 courses) towards graduation for employment. 120 hours $=4$ credits

Work hours count towards the completion of Level One training (1,500 hours)

Qualify for a $\$ 1000$ scholarship if you continue to work in the field 6 months after graduation or you amass 900 hours

If you decide to pursue that career later, those hours count towards certification
