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MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

This school year is rapidly drawing to a close and we are busily preparing for all of our year end activities and at the same time, preparation for next year is already underway. The Supreme Court of Canada decision on Class Size and Composition has had an impact on the creation of our timetable for next year. With a number of course class sizes reduced and limits on the number of students with special needs or English as an Additional Language students who have very little English, we have had to add a number of classes to our organization. Given the new class size and composition requirements the number of changes we will be able to make to student schedules will be extremely limited.

I hope that everyone was able to enjoy this year's theatre musical production of *Bye Bye Birdie*. The very talented actors performed tirelessly for eight evening and two matinee performances and thoroughly entertained their audiences every show. Special thanks to Mr. Case, Mr. Hughes, the stagecraft students and to all of the staff members who pitched in to help make this production possible.

We have also been very busy preparing for all of the upcoming grad events. Our year-end celebrations for our Grade 12 students include: the Commencement Ceremony, which will take place at the Queen Elizabeth Theatre on Saturday, June 10th at 11:00 am; the Grad Dinner/Dance, which will take place on Saturday, June 17th at the Fairmont Waterfront followed by the After Grad celebrations which will be held at the school; the graduation of our French Immersion students at the CPF's Grade 12 French Leaving Ceremony, taking place on Friday, June 23rd at 1:00 pm in the gym; and our annual Awards Ceremony, which will take place on Wednesday, June 21st at 7:00 pm at the Coquitlam Alliance Church.

In less than four weeks our regular classes will come to an end. 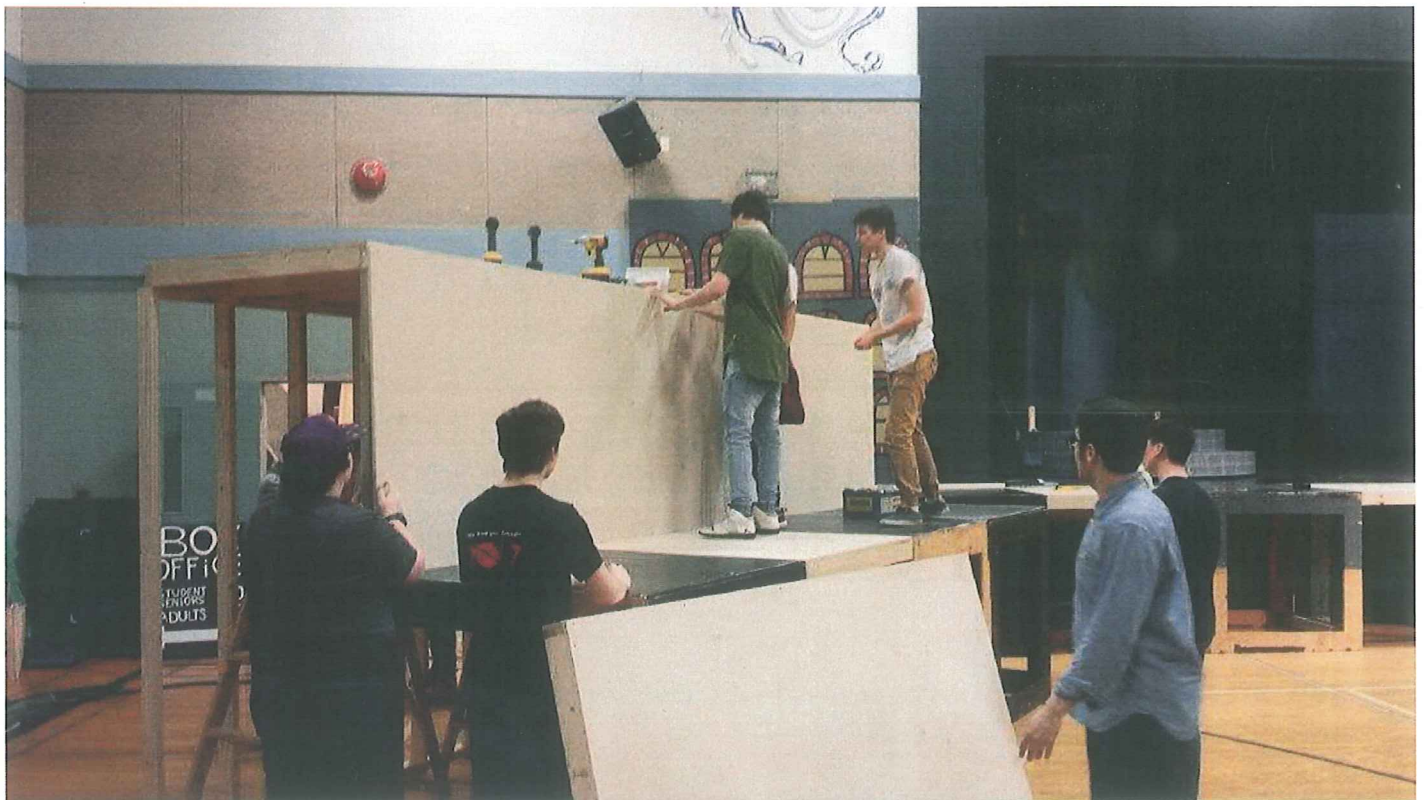

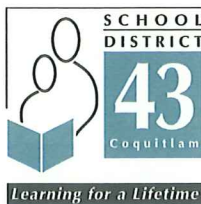

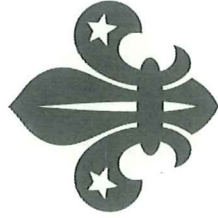
