Authentic Assessment

I haven't shared this story before but I'm sure it's past any statue of limitation. Every word is true. So here goes....

A long time ago (in a galaxy far, far away), I was challenged by a parent regarding his son's Grade Four report card. I was teaching a Grade Four class early in my career and the first term report cards had just

gone home. Grade Four marks the first time that parents see an evaluation that they are more familiar with rather than the anecdotal pri-

mary reports. For many parents, it can be a shock.

This particular father immediately requested a meeting because he strongly disagreed with his son's letter grade. The child had received a C+ in language arts. The parent wanted an A and nothing less. His son was a kind, diligent student who tried his best.

I began talking about ways to support his child's learning so that he does improve. The parent did not want to hear this. He wanted an A right now.

He was quite emotional when he described his future plans for his child and how receiving such a letter grades would prevent him from reaching medical school.

### No kidding.

I assured him that universities do not request a fourth grade transcript. This enraged him. I also mentioned that a C+ meant that his son had demonstrated a good understanding of concepts and materials we covered in class. This further enraged him. I assured him that his son had many

> years left in the public system to improve his grades. The parent became belligerent.

As he ranted on, my thoughts drifted off to think about all of the toys I didn't have as a child. Perhaps I smiled a bit in nostalgia but I was

snapped back to reality when he began

raising his voice,

challenging me

over the authenticity of the reporting.

I got up and walked over to a different child's desk and pulled out her writing folder. I knew that this child had demonstrated an excellent achievement in writing. I placed her work in front of him and said, "This student got an A. Compare this to your son's writing."

He read her work and asked if she was in the same grade. I confirmed it. He became very quiet. In one of the most unbelievable moments of my career, he pulled out his wallet and asked me if there was anything he could do to "help his son along."



I told him to put his wallet away and that the letter grade reflected his son's current achievement in reading and writing.

He left the room and a week later, transferred his son to another school.

I reflected upon how teachers can place the emphasis on a child's learning rather than haggling over letter grades. Perhaps I should have been in communication with the parent more frequently before the report card. The old analogy holds true in education, it's just as important on how you get there as the destination itself.

### Authentic Assessment

Assessment and reporting can look very different than the traditional letter grade.

Effective assessment should help guide the child in his/her learning by providing real-time feedback. Assessment looks different in each grade. Here are three examples of assessment that can more effectively help learning. Parents are very familiar with letter grades but, letter grades themselves may not always tell the whole story.

### Performance Standards

This form of assessment is a grid that describes what learning looks like at different stages of achievement. This is an example of the Grade 5 Personal Writing standard. Ms. Ogilvie, Mr. Leuvekamp, Mrs. Khan and Mrs. Swanson use this method to help assess their student's writing. The students are aware of the expectations and can also see what areas they need to work on. You can find performance standards for reading and writing on the Ministry of Education's website for all grades.

#### On-Going Assessment

Providing immediate feedback to the student about how he/she is doing helps guide so that corrections can be made for instant improvement. Mrs. Derksen reports that for writing, she constantly meets and provides immediate feedback to her writers. Mrs. Grist and the other primary classes frequently invites parents (and grandparents) to come and look at the student's work and the students can share their work with a different audience.

### Portfolios

A portfolio allows the teacher and the student to see the progress made over the course of a term or a year. Ms. Callihoo and Mrs. Kirsh keep writing portfolio's for their students that has snapshots of their child's writing from the beginning of the year until now. We can see the growth and where the child has made significant progress.

### MESSAGE TO PARENTS/GUARDIANS REPORT CARDS

It is that time of year when typically some of our schools send report cards home to parents and guardians.

However, the labour dispute between the BC Teachers' Federation (BCTF) and the BC Public School Employers' Association (BCPSEA) that started at the beginning of the school year is still ongoing. Some of the specific activities that the BCTF indicated teachers would not engage in during the current strike activity include the following:

- Prepare and distribute report cards; and
- Provide any student assessment data to Administrative Officers or the school office, except Grade 12 marks required for graduation, post-secondary applications and scholarship purposes.

Rather than send home a report card with little information we are asking parents to contact teachers directly for information on student attendance and progress. Teachers have been communicating to parents via email, phone calls, notes home, and through face to face meetings.
