These courses provide a path for students who achieved 40-49% in a course (during this 2020-2021 school year) to attain a passing grade. Students will be able to upgrade their mark to 50% (C-).

These courses will follow a hybrid format: Students will attend in-person for a Face-to-Face class once a week (either Thursday or Friday; you will be notified before the course starts as to which day you are to attend) and will attend online scheduled classes the other days.

Registration for Remedial courses is by referral only, see website or your high school counsellor for details. Referrals will be accepted until June 25. The referral form will collect some brief information from your teacher so we can customize your course to what you need to complete.







WORK in Trades Program

Youth WORK in Trades isn't a traditional high school course. Students in this program already have a paid job with an experienced tradesperson and complete the coursework online through Coquitlam Open Learning.

For every **120 hours** that students work in an apprenticeable trade with a certified tradesperson, they can:

- gain high school credits
- learn and apply specific skills while getting paid;
- earn hours towards trade certification
- qualify for a \$1000 award from the Ministry of Education.

No.. Some students simply collect the hours and earn the extra credits and The \$1000 award. Others choose to start their apprenticeship and use the hours towards certification in the Trade

YMCA Summer Work Student Exchange (SWSE) is a government-funded, national program offers opportunities for youth (aged 16 and 17) to improve their second official language skills, explore another part of Canada, and gain valuable work experience through a 4-week exchange to Québec during the summer.

- When taking part in the SWSE program, students live with a host family in Québec and are paid the provincial minimum wage to work full-time at a non-profit organization or public sector job such as a summer camp, childcare centre, community museum, etc. During weekends, students participate in a variety of group activities that allow them to get to know the culture, arts, history, and recreation opportunities of their new community. SWSE is funded by the Department of Canadian Heritage and is offered at minimal cost (\$125) to participants; this includes transportation to and from Québec, as well as all program activities. This is an excellent and low-cost opportunity for youth to enhance their French skills through immersion. Further information can be found on our website: https://swse.ymcagta.org/
- To ensure a safe exchange for youth and host families, the SWSE team has been continually updating program protocols to adhere to local and national health authority recommendations and guidelines related to COVID-19. Keeping in mind case numbers, vaccination rollouts, and broader risks, we will continue to modify the program as necessary to provide a safe, fun, and impactful experience for all.



 We're delighted to invite your school to participate in The Boardroom, Rotman Commerce's High School Business Case Competition. Open to students in grades 9 through 11, the Boardroom is a team-based competition that challenges participants to work together on a business idea.
 Each team will be comprised of four individuals and can be a mix of students from different grades but all must be from the same school. No prior business knowledge or experience is required.

This year, we are offering over \$1,000 in prizes to teams who use teamwork, creativity, and analytical skills to propose a solution to key challenges in an area of business. There are two rounds of competition. Finalists of the first written round will be invited to compete in the final two presentation rounds online in October. The finalists will present to The Boardroom – a panel of judges – and have the opportunity to learn from highly regarded business professionals.

This year's case is accessible upon each team's registration. Students will have until May 31, 2021 to register and submit their proposals. We will not accept additional registrations or submissions after this deadline.

Twelve teams will be invited to compete round 2, which will be held virtually on Saturday, October 16, 2021. Finalists will present to our alumni judges over video conference. All finalists will receive certificates of recognition and a chance to speak with current students, alumni and industry professionals.

The top three teams will receive gift cards and special certificates of excellence. <u>Each member of the first-place team will be eligible for a \$2,500 award toward first-year Rotman Commerce tuition.</u> To claim the award, students must receive and accept an offer of admission from Rotman Commerce and register in our program once they are eligible for university.

Health Care Access Program: Job Opportunity after graduation

COVID-19 has increased the need for additional staff in long-term care and assisted living services. Typically, these positions require prior experience and education. The Health Career Access Program provides a path for applicants with no health care experience to get hired and receive on-the-job training.

How to get your career started

- COVID-19 has increased the need for health care assistants in long-term care and assisted living services.
- Normally, to become a health care assistant, you must complete six to eight months of post-secondary education at your own expense before you can apply for a position.
- Through the Health Career Access Program, the Province will pay for your post-secondary education.

New hires in the program start in a health care support worker position and receive paid training that leads to full qualification as a health care assistant.

Please note: All successful program applicants must start as a health care support worker before advancing to a health care assistant position.

Health care support worker

- Health care support workers are supervised by registered nurses or other regulated health care professionals. They provide a
 variety of critical non-clinical, non-direct care supports to patients and residents.
- Typical duties include:
- Participating as an integral member of a healthcare delivery team
- Establishing a caring relationship with clients, residents and families
- Providing support and assistance with mealtime activities
- Providing support and assistance in carrying out activities
- Performing housekeeping duties
- Greeting and directing visitors
- Restocking supplies
- Completing and maintaining relevant records
- Health care support workers earn \$20.95 an hour.
