Principal's Message

As promised, this month I have included information about the Core Competencies. This is part of our revised curriculum from the Ministry of Education. These 6 competencies were always there but took a backseat to the curricular studies. They are Communication, Creative and Critical Thinking, Positive Personal and Cultural Identity, Personal Awareness and Responsibility and Social Responsibility. The big change in assessment in this area is Student Voice. This means that students will learn about self-assessment in these areas, rather than focusing on Teacher assessment. During the year, we will be guiding the students through this and I have included a section that explains this a little more fully.

We have already started our Christmas Concert preparations and the gingerbread houses have been ordered for that last couple of weeks before vacation. As we get out of school earlier in the month, December 16, events will fly quickly so please keep in touch with the school online calendar and your classroom teacher so you do not miss special events or opportunities. Safety First at Nestor!

We are very lucky to have such a caring community at Nestor. We love having families in and around the school but some safety concerns have been brought to our attention and we would like to let you know about some changes. We would like to limit the number of adults in the hallways and tighten up some safety protocols and that means having your help.

When you drop off your child to school late, please leave them at the school door. This is a great way to foster independence and all of our students, from K-Grade 5 are able to get themselves prepared for the daily routine. Doing these routines by themselves makes them proud and will help them to slip in a little more discretely. Once the class has started the morning routines, it is important to have as few disruptions as possible for optimum learning time and your help is appreciated.

If you arrive early to pick up your child, please check in at the office. We deliver! We will page your child to the office which means you do not need to sign in and pick up a guest tag to mark your presence. We will ask you to do this if you are volunteering and it is to identify you as a safe adult but also as a safety measure for you. If there is an emergency, it would be documented that you are in the building and we need to ensure your safety as well as that of the children. All students being picked up early need to be signed out at the office.



Your cooperation is appreciated and we would like to thank you as we are all putting the children's safety foremost in our thoughts.

Traffic and being a Good Neighbour



We have a large number of our families that drive in to school regularly or for special events. It is important to be Good Neighbours in our community and it's a great way to teach your children how to be good citizens. We are exploring our Revised Curriculum and there is an interesting change. Like many important changes, the more things change, the more they remain the same! These 6 areas have always played an important role in a child's development but at this time they are in the forefront of the discussion. This is about the student voice. Students will be asked to assess their progress in these areas throughout the year and teachers will work with them on how to accurately assess their progress and develop new goals for learning.

These areas of growth are woven into every specific subject matter at school as well as general learning. In a particular project, such as a speech on Wild Cats, for example, there could be aspects of critical and creative thinking as well as communication objectives.

Student-led conferences are a way we have showcased self-assessment in the past as it partnered with more typical teacher marks and reports. Our teachers will be working with students to figure out the different parts and develop a better understanding of just where they are in their learning and what goals they need to set to move forward. It might change each time we do a new assessment so that we can explore different types and formats. It's a work in progress!

Tips for Reading to Children

Reading material for this experience can be at any level of difficulty; from very easy to quite sophisticated.

- Read daily to your child and choose a time that suits your family schedule.
- Make this a joyful and relaxing experience in a comfortable and cozy place.
- Be playful, enthusiastic, and expressive as you read.
- To captivate your child's interest and activate prior knowledge, read titles and look at pictures before reading.
- Model a sense of curiosity and wonder about pictures and ideas as you are reading using prompts such as: I wonder why . . . Isn't this interesting . . . This makes me think about . . . or Wow . . .
- Be willing to stop for discussions and answer questions your child might have. This will happen quite naturally.
- Share ideas, feelings, and thoughts with your child and help make connections between their own life and what you are reading.
- Encourage your child to visualize and act out parts of the story. This helps the stories come alive.
- Use your finger to track words as you read. This reinforces reading left to right, top to bottom, and helps to develop the concept of matching the spoken word to the printed word. Sometimes children want to take responsibility for doing the finger tracking themselves.
- Consider using bookmarks and pointers to vary the tracking process.
- Don't discourage your child from asking to have their favourite stories read over and over again. When children no longer have to concentrate on the plot, they naturally focus on the flow of language and memorize words.



And finally. . .

- Read what your child and you are interested in.
- Read a wide variety of material such as children's magazines, fact or information books, poems, story books, books with rhyme, fairy tales, and fables.
