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
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Have Candians forsaken their own politics?



"I love all of the memory that I can use," says Fran Webb, an owner of a BlackBerry Pearl. "There's so much space for all of


BlackBerry offers free updates and new applications for download almost everyday, ranging from games to weather and everything in between.
