2016-2017 School Year - the future is now

We are well into planning for next school year. Now that the Kindergarten registration process is over and the cross catchment process nearly complete, we will have a better idea of our enrolment numbers for next year.

Enrolment numbers are critical and determine how many divisions we will have next year, their composition (ie. blended grades or straight grades) and the loss, addition or retention of staff. Last year, just the unexpected departure a few children over the summer resulted in a whole school reorganization in September and rendered meaningless dozens of hours of careful class planning. We plan in the spring with the most accurate and current enrolment numbers possible but it's the children who actually come through the doors in September that determine everything.

In May, we will start the class building process. This will be the beginning of many hours of careful thought and consideration by staff about students and their class placements. Rest assured your child's teacher knows your child well and each and every child will be placed with care. There are a host of factors that come into play when building classes including:

- Legislated class size limits (22 for K and K/1; 24 for 1-3 and 3/4 blends; 30 for grade 4/5's)
- Age and grade balance: especially when building a blended class (example grade K/1 or 3/4 blend). You would not build a 2/3 blend class with three grade 2's and twenty grade 3's
- unique learning needs or styles
- friends
- social dynamics

Sometimes I receive requests from parents hoping to place their child with a specific teacher; please know that we do not entertain specific requests for teachers.

I am always happy and willing to discuss your child's unique learning needs and welcome you to come see me before mid-May if you think I should know something about your child that may assist our placement decisions. Unfortunately, some parents do not engage in these discussions and wait until classes are already in effect in September to tell us information that may have helped us in the placement process.

I can tell you that the second week of September, when new classes are in effect is the worst time to let us know about anything, especially if classes are full. Full classes mean no movement or flexibility is possible.

At this time there is no "final" class organization plan. All we have are scenarios. Our English Kindergarten numbers for September were at 11 last week. Today we have 22 enrolled! So much can and will change between now and June when we do an initial organization plan. Much more can and will change again before opening in September.

I will keep you up to date on organization plans in the coming week and months.
