REMINDER - MARK YOUR CALENDARS

Friday, March 25th - Good Friday Monday, March 28th - Easter Monday

These holidays are included within Spring Break. (set your clock ahead 1 hour on March 13th)

School is back in session on Tuesday, March 29th.

DRESS CODE - CLOTHING

The manner of dress at school and school functions is expected to meet customary and generally accepted standards of suitability. Students, staff, and guests should expect a level of personal security and comfort, and students should be able to move freely without embarrassment to themselves or others in the building. For this reason, students should be dressed appropriately for class and school activities. This requires that shorts, tops, skirts, jeans, etc. are long enough so that movement can occur without exposing one's body. Students are reminded of the following:

- Dress and grooming may not create health or safety problems for the student or others who attend or work in the school
- Hats and sunglasses are not to be worn in the school corridors or classrooms
- T-shirts, blouses, and tops are expected to fully cover the chest as well as the waist of skirts and pants; underwear should not be visible
- Shorts and skirts should be an appropriate length for school
- A student's appearance must not disrupt or interfere with the educational process
- Clothing items may not emphasize alcohol, drugs, tobacco, profanity, or anything else in poor taste

Note: Aerosol containers (colognes, perfume, mists, and hairspray for example) are <u>not</u> permitted at school. Please avoid the use of heavily scented non-aerosols as well.

We have planned an early dismissal at 2 p.m. for **Wednesday April 6th** which will allow an opportunity for parent-teacher interviews. Some of our teams are considering using a slightly different format, and are planning to work with students to prepare for Student Led Conferences. SCHOLASTIC BOOK FAIR

Thanks to our PAC members, we will be hosting our second fair of this school year. This Book Fair will run from April 6th to 13th, and will be open for parents during our early dismissal day on April 6th.

We received a generous profit of \$1500 worth of Scholastic Books from our Book Fair held last fall. Our librarian Mrs. Elkan has processed the books and they are available for students to sign out.

EASTER HAMPER DRIVE

In December, parents and students generously donated food items for the SHARE food bank. At this time of year, SHARE is often running glow on many items and they need to be replenished. In particular, many staples such as: oil, sugar, and flour are in high demand. Students and staff, in conjunction with our PAC, are having another food drive so that we can donate an Easter hamper to SHARE. Each division will be given a notice that specifies what food items that division is collecting (for example, pasta). Of course, all donations are welcome. A notice will be going home with your child tomorrow. We will be collecting items until Wednesday, March 9th, 2016. Thank you in advance for your support.

VAPING

Many teens are curious about and trying a new form of smoking, called vaping. Vaping consists of battery powered electronic devices that vaporize liquids which may contain harmful chemicals. Vape pens, electronic cigarettes, and hookah pens are all forms of vaping devices being sold at your local gas stations and convenience stores claiming to be an alternative to cigarettes. Many teens believe that vaping is safer than cigarettes because they are just inhaling "fruity water", but the long term effects of vaping have not yet been determined. Many health professionals agree that vaping can be harmful to the human body. Inhaling toxic chemicals into the body at various heat temperatures can be dangerous. Possible side effects include: inflammation of lungs, narrowing of airways, allergic reactions, and shortness of breath. Vaping or buying/selling vaporizers is not allowed at school under any circumstances. Please discuss this matter with your child.
