Our Walton community is abuzz with excitement for the holiday season. Teachers and students both are engaged in a variety of activities in class related to winter and to Christmas. Our newly formed promotional committee, consisting of grade 4 and 5 student leaders, is busy preparing posters and other supporting materials in an effort to promote programs designed to provide assistance to needy families in the Tri-Cities area. Our students would appreciate the assistance of Walton families in these *spirit of giving* campaigns.

- **Typhoon Haiyan Relief:** please consider donating loose change to our school's Typhoon Haiyan Relief campaign. Starting on Wednesday, December 4<sup>th</sup>, and lasting two weeks until December 19<sup>th</sup>, our school would like to raise money for the Canadian Red Cross as it works to raise money for the communities in the Philippines that were decimated by Typhoon Haiyan. Walton teachers will be given collection envelopes for their classrooms. There will also be an opportunity for families to donate the day of the Christmas concerts.
- **Christmas Food Hamper Donation Program:** our school is, once again, running a canned food drive, in an effort to feed families who are less fortunate in the Tri-Cities area. Students are encouraged to bring in non-perishable food items for this food hamper donation program. Decorated boxes will be placed underneath our Walton Christmas tree just outside the school library. Last day to donate is Monday, December 16<sup>th</sup>.

**INCENTIVE FOR WALTON STUDENTS:** our promotional committee's student leaders have set a target of 1,000 non-perishable food items (2 per Walton student) for this year's campaign. An ability of our school community to reach this target will result in our students being treated to a feature-length movie on the last day of school before winter break. ## Division 1 Students Participate in a Totem Pole Raising Ceremony

Mr. Finlay's grade 4/5 students were treated to a wonderful ceremony in mid-November when they participated in a variety of projects that celebrated First Nations culture. These students were given guidance by one of our School District's aboriginal support workers, who taught them how to make beautiful button blankets using coloured felt and featuring many different animals indigenous to the Northwest Coast. The students also designed a part of a totem pole by intricately designing and colouring the image of an animal sacred in First Nations culture. These images were used in a totem pole raising ceremony that was attended by a number of School District personnel of aboriginal ancestry.



## Scholastic Book Fair

Walton is holding its annual Scholastic Book Fair on December 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> from 2:45 – 6:00pm each day. With line ups down the hall and out the front doors last year, Mrs. Augustyn has moved the Book Fair into the Walton school gymnasium this year. ## Emergency Drills at Walton

In an effort to be as prepared as possible in the event we are faced with a real emergency, our entire school has been practicing earthquake and fire drill evacuation procedures. Rehearsing the proper steps regularly confirms that staff and students both know the steps to take to ensure the safety of everyone in our school community.

Our school will undertake a **code yellow lockdown** drill next week. A lockdown could be triggered by a violent person in the community or within the school. It could also indicate a wild animal on the school property or be a precaution due to a police incident in the neighbourhood. **Code Yellow** is a passive lockdown that indicates a threat outside the school building or in the general vicinity of the school. A code yellow lockdown involves locking the exterior doors, lowering the shutters, locking the interior doors and taking / submitting attendance electronically to the office. During a code yellow lockdown, no one enters or leaves the building. **Code Red** is an active lockdown that suggests a threat within the school building. A code red lockdown involves locking all exterior doors, turning off the lights, lowering the shutters, locking all interior doors and hiding the children so that they are out of sight of any windows or doors. Attendance is taken and submitted electronically to the office. Nobody leaves or enters the building.

In preparing our students for a lockdown drill, we explain the drill as *just another way to keep everyone at Walton safe*. We explain things in kid-terms, and do not go into detail about the potential reasons for needing to go into a lockdown situation.
