Think of a time that you've gone to work, very upset. It's tough to focus on your job when you're distracted by an event that caused upset. This is the same as children who come to school. They can be distracted from learning.

We'd like to improve student growth in Social-Emotional development

Wee are hoping, as a result, that our students develop greater leadership skills, exhibit more attention in class, and are more engaged with their learning. We also see increased prosocial behaviour.

All of these conditions reduce the distractions that many children face when learning.

I attended a session with Miriam Miller last week. Six members of our staff will be working with Miriam Miller, an expert in this field.

Members of our staff will be working with Miriam Miller in Social Emotional Learning. Some of the behaviours at Walton distract children from their learning. Playground issues, classroom behaviour etc. all have an effect on learning.

CLOSURE OF SCHOOLS FOR EXTREME WEATHER CONDITIONS

Background

On occasion, it is necessary to temporarily close a school facility when extreme weather conditions might endanger the health and safety of students. The decision to close may also involve a discussion with the Medical Health Office, the police, or transportation personnel.

In the case of extreme weather conditions, the Superintendent or designate has authority, on behalf of the Board, to temporarily close a school.

Procedures

- 1. As a general expectation, parents are to be advised that schools are open. If parents believe the local conditions are unsafe, they may keep their child at home or arrange his/her early dismissal. If schools are to be closed before morning classes begin, an announcement will be made on local radio stations CKNW (980), CKWX (1130) and CBC (690) by 7:30 a.m. if possible. Wherever possible, the decision will be announced the previous day to enable parents more time to make alternate arrangements for their children.
- When schools are closed for extreme weather conditions, they are closed for students. If the closure is communicated prior to school opening, schools are also closed for staff. All staff will be paid for this day.
- If school is in session when the closure is announced, staff members are expected to stay and assist with the dismissal of students. Unless the situation is unsafe for staff (as determined by the principal in consultation with the assistant superintendent) they would be expected to work the remainder of the school day.
- 4. Administrators are expected to complete and have on file a "School Extreme Weather Closure Plan" (Form F-132-1). If a school were to be closed for extreme weather conditions, this plan outlines procedures to ensure the safety of any students that may arrive at school. This plan also provides for communicating with the district office and maintenance regarding school circumstances (attendance information, school conditions, immediate needs). This plan also lists the core group of staff, that includes the principal, to fulfill these functions.
- 5. The cancellation of a bus run does not mean that schools are closed. When a bus runs early in the afternoon, the safety of elementary students must be ensured.
- 6. During school electrical, water or heating failures, early student dismissal will be based on the prognosis obtained by the Principal on:
 - 5.1 heating/temperature conditions
 - 5.2 light availability in washroom and work areas
 - 5.3 recovery time estimated by BC Hydro, BC Gas or Manager of Maintenance
 - 5.4 student age



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ALLERGIES AND EPI PENS

Walton Elementary has grown so large that we need to reexamine how students with allergies store their Epi-Pens.

We are encouraging students to keep their Epi-Pen with them at all times. In the event of immediate need, we will not spend time trying to locate the Epi-Pen. This can be carried in a fannypack.

If you feel that the Epi-Pen does not need to be carried

on your child's person at all times, it will be stored in their backpack. This will allow our staff to more easily locate the Epi-Pen if needed.

Ideally the school would have 2 epi-pens but we understand that the cost of these items can be expensive.
