Teachers Find Common Ground a World Away

SD43's International Education Programs are intended to achieve the goal of internationalization for the benefit of all students and employees, equipping them with the knowledge, skills, and experiences to be leaders in the globalized world of today and the future. In support of this goal SD43 provides opportunities for teachers, administrators and students to travel abroad and engage with our sister schools.

Over the 2018 spring break five administrators and 20 teachers visited 15 sister schools in six school districts where they engaged with 12,500 students and created thousands of memories all in 10 days during a whirlwind trip that has left them amazed, enlightened and informed.

This remarkable journey to China was another opportunity to provide administrators and teachers with once-in-a-lifetime professional development and cultural exchange experiences that will benefit their students and themselves - now and throughout their entire educational careers.

Teacher professional development trips like this one occur annually in SD43 and provide significant professional and personal growth for administrators and teachers through their engagement with fellow Chinese educators. Even though the language can be a barrier, it becomes quickly evident that



regardless of what country teachers are from, what political climate their country has, or how different some educational systems appear on the surface, all educators have common ground - they all wish to provide the best education and support for their students.



To that end the SD43 group found many similarities in teaching and school leadership between the two countries but were also able to learn from the Chinese administrators and teachers while helping them learn about B.C.'s curriculum, teaching strategies and best practices. It was an exchange of knowledge that makes the world much smaller and reminded them that as educators they are engaged in life-long learning.

Another benefit of the trip was that it provided significant hands-on understanding of the challenges that SD43's international students from all countries face when they come to B.C. This also helps administrators and teachers better support our Canadian students and their parents, many who are originally from Asian countries.

Nothing speaks louder than the words of those who were on the trip and learned first-hand the many important aspects of diversity and inclusiveness in other cultures and countries around the world. The trip provided invaluable hands-on lessons to be used in SD43 and those on the trip grew in their leadership capacity and abilities enriching themselves for existing and future teaching and leadership opportunities.

These positive outcomes also benefit students as our educators gain more worldviews, cultural experiences and a compassionate understanding of all students and the learning challenges they may face.




