

Regular Board Meeting of April 9, 2024

Serving the communities of Anmore, Belcarra, Coquitlam, Port Coquitlam and Port Moody







1. On April 8, A group of 30 Terry Fox Secondary School STEAM students participated in groundbreaking scientific research, the Solar Max International Animal Behaviour Eclipse Research Project in Fort Worth Texas. The data collected, combined the efforts of many other participants across North America will be the largest-ever scientific study of animal behaviour during a total solar eclipse.

The event was a phenomenal success, marked by a total eclipse, during which our students, under the leadership of Dr. Adam Hartstone-Rose from North Carolina State University, received training in research methodology, data collection protocols, and proper observational techniques.

The students' contributions were significant, adding fifteen new species to the observational data and enhancing the understanding of previously observed species through research done by Dr. Adam Hartstone-Rose in 2017. The results from the research are expected to close the gap in our fundamental understanding of the natural world and have implications for fields such as agriculture, ecology, biology, and astronomy. Our results will be compiled and published in a peer-reviewed journal.

The field trip was the culmination of a year's worth of fundraising efforts by our students, who managed the Ravens Nest store along with various other fundraisers. The group was very fortunate to receive significant financial support from Maxine Wilson and AHR's research funding, totaling over \$30,000 in value.

Edward Csuka shares, "I am incredibly proud of our group of our Terry Fox Secondary STEAM students who showed tremendous grit, determination, and perseverance to endure the rigorous requirements of high-quality biological research. Some of the students have committed to helping analyze the vast amounts of data that will come from across the continent to be included in the eventual project's publication."



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2. Congratulations to the 12 grade 11 and 12 students who successfully participated in the Coquitlam Junior Firefighter program over spring break! These students underwent an intensive week-long training and got a chance to learn skills such as rappelling off towers, understanding fire behaviour, practicing fire ground drills, climbing ladders, performing auto extrication, and learning first aid. The program is a condensed version of the eight-week firefighter basic training, giving participants a glimpse into the daily challenges and rewards of firefighting. 3. Congratulations to the Port Moody Secondary School students for their outstanding performance at the 46th University of British Columbia Physics Olympics held March 9<sup>th</sup>. Competing against 930 students in 76 teams from across the province, our Grade 11 and 12 teams showcased exceptional perseverance and resilience.

The Grade 11 team excelled, reaching the Quizzics Final and securing a spot among the top 13 contestants. Meanwhile, the Grade 12 team not only placed third in the Sound of Science event but also achieved a remarkable victory by becoming the overall Physics Olympics Champions.

This achievement follows their impressive performance last November at the KPU Science Competition, where the students won 1st and 3rd place, continuing their winning momentum. Well done, students!











4. On March 13, Harbour View Elementary School gathered to celebrate a significant milestone: its 60th anniversary. This momentous occasion was honoured in the presence of distinguished guests, Trustees Carol Brodie, Jennifer Blatherwick, Chuck Denison, and Assistant Superintendent Carey Chute, who joined the celebration to pay tribute to the school's long-standing heritage and accomplishments.

The event featured particularly memorable speeches, especially from former Principal John Richardson, who led the school from 1997 to 2000. His reflections on the school's past achievements and community impact added depth to the celebration.



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Highlighting the event were former teachers Aaron Rahn and Jean Glover, who captivated and delighted the audience with their humorous and entertaining speeches about their teaching experiences at Harbour View Elementary, offering a lighter and more personal perspective on the school's history.

The event was further graced by the presence of former administrators Ray Comeau (1990-1997), Sue Reynolds, Wendy Yu, and Michelle Reid, whose attendance underscored the strong sense of community and ongoing connection among the school's past leadership, a testament to the enduring legacy and influence of Harbour View Elementary School within the community.







5. A new nestbox project at Blakeburn Lagoons in Port Coquitlam was proudly completed by 27 students from Terry Fox Secondary's STEAM 10 class. Each student 3D-designed and laser-cut their own unique nestbox, custom-made for indigenous cavity-nesting bird species impacted by human development.

Each box was precisely engineered to specific dimensions with a tight friction fit, eliminating the need for glue, nails, or screws. A wide variety of designs was completed and laser-etched with fun facts, quotes, and poems.

Special thanks to John Saremba and the Burke Mountain Naturalists Society for guiding the students with their nestbox designs!

Students were offered the opportunity to have their nestbox mounted at Blakeburn Lagoons in cooperation with the City of Port Coquitlam (Special thanks to Jamie Castro for mounting the boxes!).

Students Mason, Mayth, and Yari also signed a "Declaration of Nestbox Stewardship," demonstrating their commitment to ongoing cleaning, maintenance, and reporting of nestbox activity. Well done, students!

6. The SD43 Career and Trades Program is partnering with ACCESS BC to offer indigenous students in Grades 10 to 12 a three-day trades sampler at Port Moody Secondary from April 10 to 12<sup>th</sup>. This three-day experience will allow students to learn more about carpentry, welding, and CNC Machining.

(Miller Park Community School)

Miller Park students hosted an event featuring a special dance and a presentation about the Nowruz tradition and the Haft-sin table. They learned that each item on the table starts with the letter 'S' and symbolizes different hopes for the New Year. For example, 'sabzeh' (sprouted wheatgrass) represents rebirth and renewal, while 'seeb' (apple) symbolizes health and beauty.

In the afternoon, parents served tea and sweets from a Persian bakery to all the families, enhancing the festive atmosphere. This gathering was particularly meaningful as it was part of the school's diversity project and welcomed many new families from Iran, fostering a deep sense of belonging and community. 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#### (Hampton Park Elementary)
