Sustainability Highlights: 2024-2025 School Year













This school year, SD43 celebrated incredible achievements in sustainability, thanks to the enthusiasm, curiosity, and commitment of our SD43 community. Together, we've taken meaningful steps to reduce our environmental impact and to build a greener future for our schools and our students.

One of our most exciting milestones was in the completion of our newest school - Coast Salish Elementary — British Columbia's first net-zero energy school. Coast Salish features high efficiency heat pumps, LED lighting, and a rooftop solar array allowing the school to produce as much energy as it consumes. This school sets a new standard for sustainable education, inspiring students to engage with energy conservation firsthand.

Across the district, our schools have embraced a wide range of activities that brought sustainability to life.

Over 657 students participated in the SD43 Eco- Challenge in celebration of Earth Day — turning off lights, unplugging devices, bundling up in cozy sweaters, and bringing litter-less lunches.

Our Sweater Day campaign saw wonderful participation across SD43, with special recognition to Birchland, Mountain View, Kilmer, and Montgomery for raising awareness about energy conservation.

Forty-Five school garden clubs planted herbs and vegetables we supplied for their gardens.

Our District-Wide Clothing Swap was a huge success with over 3,000 quality items collected and redistributed for reuse, thanks to the generosity of SD43 families.


The Energy Detective activity engaged students in monitoring and tracking electrical consumption to see how small daily choices can lead to big energy savings.


Summary SD43 Carbon Reporting 2024

The district continues to align with BC's Climate Action Legislation and targets in the reduction of our overall Greenhouse Gas Emissions (GHG). Climate education and energy conservation are integrated into our district's daily practices, reflecting our commitment to environmental sustainability.

SD43 continues to sustain a culture of carbon awareness through infrastructure upgrades and behaviour-based programs. We have maintained our annual goal to reduce energy use by 3%, which has direct impact on our GHG reduction. We have reduced our overall emissions by 40% since 2010 even with an expanding district.



Our use of paper is the sole area that we have increased our carbon footprint this past year. While other environmental factors have improved, the district's higher paper consumption remains the leading cause of the increased carbon footprint this year. However, our district leaders remain committed to reducing paper use and its associated GHG emissions. We hope to further explore ways to collaborate with teachers and administrators to promote paperless practices, such as adopting digital signatures and setting double-sided printing as the default across all printers. We applaud those schools that have taken on initiatives such as "good on one side" paper trays to encourage reuse and minimize waste.



The district will continue advancing sustainability through education, operational efficiencies, and leadership in climate action.
