
- 1. Academically are on track in reading, writing and numeracy.
- 2. Emerging/Developing when it comes to learning about local Indigenous people.
- 3. Developing when it comes to teaching our students about their mental health.
- 4. Exceeding when it comes to connectedness to adults and enjoyment at school.

Our intellectual development goal is unique. It doesn't fit into any of the district categories like STEAM, Career Education, Reading, Writing or Numeracy. What it does do though is fit seamlessly into our Indigenous and Human and Social Development goals by looping the Communication core competency through story telling in a circle format.

Storytelling is an accessible goal for all our learners. We have over 220 ELL learners and they tend to speak English before they can read or write and we know that our early primary learners are further along with oral communication than compared with reading and writing. By establishing storytelling as our intellectual development goal SCE students can exchange ideas and perspectives to build shared understanding and solve problems by listening and sharing personal narratives in a circle format.

This makes an communication core competency theme make sense for our community by weaving the EASE program and SEL strategies through a circle discussion format. We can alleviate and prevent many of the unhealthy worries that our students have or could experience using the lessons in EASE. We know that our students need to learn more about their mental health from the Student Learning and MDI surveys.
