Students are very productive during class time and seemingly enjoying being here. Our classes are fuller this year than in any years past, as we increased our enrolment to 70 students. Yet despite our rooms being busier, day in and day out there is a quiet, productive tone in the classrooms. Our Connections program is seeing a good level of engagement as students overall are participating in the activities we plan. This all is a credit to each of our students for understanding the culture and atmosphere that we want to build here at CLC. It is also a tribute to the staff's hard work to connect one-to-one with as many students as possible each block and give them the assistance they need. It is also due to the staff's teamwork and creative planning.

On a personal note, I will soon say farewell to CLC. You likely saw my recent email announcing my retirement as of January 31, 2024. I will greatly miss the CLC community, it's been a huge part of my life the last seven years. When I came to CLC in 2016, there was no principal just for CLC as the administration was handled by a district principal.
