The other day I was walking by the school swing set at recess and I noticed about 40 students (grades 1-5) lined up against the fence. This struck me as a little different than our regular playground behaviour so I wandered over and asked what they were doing. Immediately, all 40 children started to tell me what they were doing. After stopping this mayhem I managed to get one student to explain it to me. Apparently they were playing Zombies vs. Humans. How do you play Zombies vs. Humans I asked? What I learned is that the Zombies try to eat the humans and when they catch them the humans turn into Zombies. And the humans try to 'shoot' the Zombies with a potion that causes them to 'die' (I thought Zombies were already dead...or maybe undead? Yeah, definitely undead). Then the Zombies crash to the ground for 30 seconds and become human again.

My immediate thoughts went to 'shoot' and 'die'. I know my wife and I have spent much time talking about what games we let our own children play. Do we let them play with fake swords? Do we let them 'shoot' each other with Buzz Lightyear's Blaster? Many of these questions have fallen under the category that they are things we would probably prefer they didn't do, but were also not the proverbial hills we wanted to 'die' on. (Although the blaster makes a hideously annoying sound, so this one does often 'go missing')

Then I looked at the group of kids, there was a mix of boys and girls from a wide range of ages playing the game. I told them that I wanted to watch them play for a few minutes. They quickly sorted themselves into teams and started to play. Kids were running everywhere (I still have no idea how they knew who was a human and who was a zombie), there were definitely humans shooting zombies with potions, and many kids lying lifeless on the ground before reemerging as humans. A large group of kids ended up standing on the edge of the swing area in a line, I am still not sure how they ended up there. But in general everyone appeared to be having fun, appeared safe, and was getting some good exercise.

As the game continued I decided that the shooting needed to go. In this day and age it doesn't seem right for kids to be running around pretending to shoot each other, even if they are pretending to be zombies. Thus the Humans now tag the zombies, and the game seems to still work. Likely the game will fade out by the end of the week, and everyone will have moved onto something new, but I would love to hear your opinion on this type of game on a school yard. I wonder about the relationship between individual family values and expectations and the general values and expectations of our larger community.

#### **May Day Festivities**


