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#### PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE:

Dear Parents/Guardians:

Now that we are into the month of October, students and teachers are already deep into the learning and teaching in the classrooms. Students are settling into their new classrooms and school routines. In order to help enforce our school routines, we would like to reduce the number of classroom interruptions at the beginning of the day. You can help support the school by ensuring that your child is on time for "Power Up". A warning bell rings at 8:40am and students are expected to be in the gym no later than 8:45 am with their class.

Children who are late for school miss out on important organizational time and instruction. A student entering class late disrupts the focus of the other children in the class and the flow of the lesson. We understand that periodically emergencies arise that

necessitate child being late for school, but habitual lateness does impact your child's learning.

In addition, we ask that students line up outside with their classmates and not come into the building with parents as we would like to promote some independence with our younger students. We would also like to limit the number of classroom interruptions at the end of the day with students leaving 10 or 15 minutes early on a consistent basis. Please wait for the 2:45 bell to pick up your child. The end of the day is very busy and an important organizational time for students. However, we do understand that family emergencies may arise upon occasion that may require you to pick up your child

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#### STUDENTS' SUPPORT PROGRAM AND SERVICES

Student Services At Cape Horn, the various educational needs of our children are met both within the classroom and by specialized professionals within the school. Our student

support staff work as a team to provide additional service to children in many areas. These include learning assistance and resource programming, EAL, challenge or gifted programs, counseling and, speech and language support. These services are provided to children with identified needs, in both in-class and pull-out programs. The following staff comprise our Student Services team:

Mrs. Kristina Dressel provides skill development instruction and support to Kindergarten to Grade 5 students, and coordinates the schedules for the EAs.

Mrs. Tanis Kennedy provides English as an Additional Language (EAL) support and instruction. She provides classroom support for Learning Assistance and writes Individual Education Programs for students with identified learning difficulties.

Mrs. Tia Turner provides EAL support and teaches our students music.

Mrs. Andrea Moschetti will be working with gifted learners, provides learning assistance support and skill development.

Ms Anya Bayley, our Speech and Language Pathologist, works with those children requiring articulation support or language development. Ms. Bayley will be at Cape Horn every Thursday.

Mr. Bill McGovern is our school counselor and can be contacted at anytime.

Mrs. Angie Bermisa, Ms. Donnalee Bridges, Mrs. Charlene Dalke, Mrs. Jacqueline Dobson, Mrs. Joyce Donald, Mrs. Terri-Lynn Girond, Ms Margaux Jackson, Mrs. Monique Power and Mrs. Helen Satterwhite are the Education Assistants (EA's) who work with individual students who have special needs as well as groups of students who require support and assistance. Please contact any of the above staff members if you have any questions regarding their programs or the support they are providing your child.

#### DRESSING FOR THE COOLER WEATHER



With the cooler fall weather now here, please check how your child is dressed when leaving for school. Children should be dressed appropriately for the weather. Layers are always a good idea as we go into autumn. Winter will soon be upon us so remember

that your child will need a winter coat or snowsuit, a hat, mitts, and boots. Children will continue to change into their indoor shoes upon entering the school. Don't forget those rain boots and rain jackets on wet days. Remember to label your children's clothing items with their names; this will ensure that you have those items returned to you, should they get left behind.

#### IMPORTANT FORMS

#### IS IT BULLYING? OR IS IT CONFLICT?

It is important to distinguish between bullying behaviour and normal conflict. Children may accuse someone of bullying when it is actually conflict. To clarify the difference, ask 5 key questions:

How often does it happen? Bullying behaviour occurs repeatedly.

Do both children have a similar level of power (are they friends)? Bullies have more power than their victims and they are not friends with them.

Is it serious (threat of physical and/or emotional harm)? Bullying victims tend to have strong emotional reaction to the situation (very afraid/upset)

Is the aggressor attempting to display and/or obtain material things? Bullies tend to be motivated by external rewards including status.

Does the perpetrator take responsibility for their actions, show remorse and make an effort to resolve the problem? Bullies generally blame their victims, show no remorse, and make no effort to resolve the situation.
