

Finding answers

Passionate about research, Alexis has always been interested in finding creative ways to solve problems. The Associate of Arts Degree in Criminology at Douglas helped her develop her skills, showing her how she could improve her community by effecting its legal rules and procedures – also known as public policy.

“Public policy may sound boring, but it can change society, which I think is really important,” says Alexis. “The Criminology program gave me the opportunity to analyze public policy on a deeper level, allowing me to think more critically about policy issues and try to find solutions.”

Her interest in research and public policy led to a practicum with New Westminster Fire and Rescue Services as a policy analyst. Collaborating with other fire departments across B.C., she researched how to effectively train fire officers, who hold leadership positions within a department. While there was no standardized training, she found common concerns and identified solutions,

improving the everyday work of New Westminster’s firefighters. Following her practicum, Alexis was encouraged by her instructors to take on the research-intensive Bachelor of Arts in Criminology – Honours.

Her experience in the honours program has encouraged Alexis to go further and get a masters degree at SFU, and eventually become an instructor.

“After I get my Masters in Criminology and more experience in the field, teaching feels like the next logical step,” says Alexis. “It would be nice to give students a similar experience to what I had as a Criminology student.”

Hitting a career home run

Although he had yet to determine his career, Nat knew that sports would always be a part of it. They had grown up loving baseball and hockey, and that passion never left, leading him to work in local community sports.

Nat considered sports journalism careers, but with few opportunities in B.C. they sought a new path with Douglas College's Diploma in Sport Science.

"The program acted as a gateway to what I wanted to do with my life and my time," Nat says. "It gave me the confidence to go after bigger goals, offering me a launching point to pursue what I love."

The program's flexibility allowed Nat to explore aspects of different sports careers, helping him define his own. Nat knew then that they wanted to shape a new baseball-industry role, combining coaching with expertise in sports medicine, athletic therapy and biomechanics.

Nat found support in his

studies, encountering encouraging instructors, personalized feedback and hands-on experience with industry equipment.

"The diploma was a great introduction to sport science," Nat says. "It gave me a chance to explore and gain confidence in myself before fully diving into a bachelor's degree to continue building my own role."

YOU'LL GET EXPERIENCE

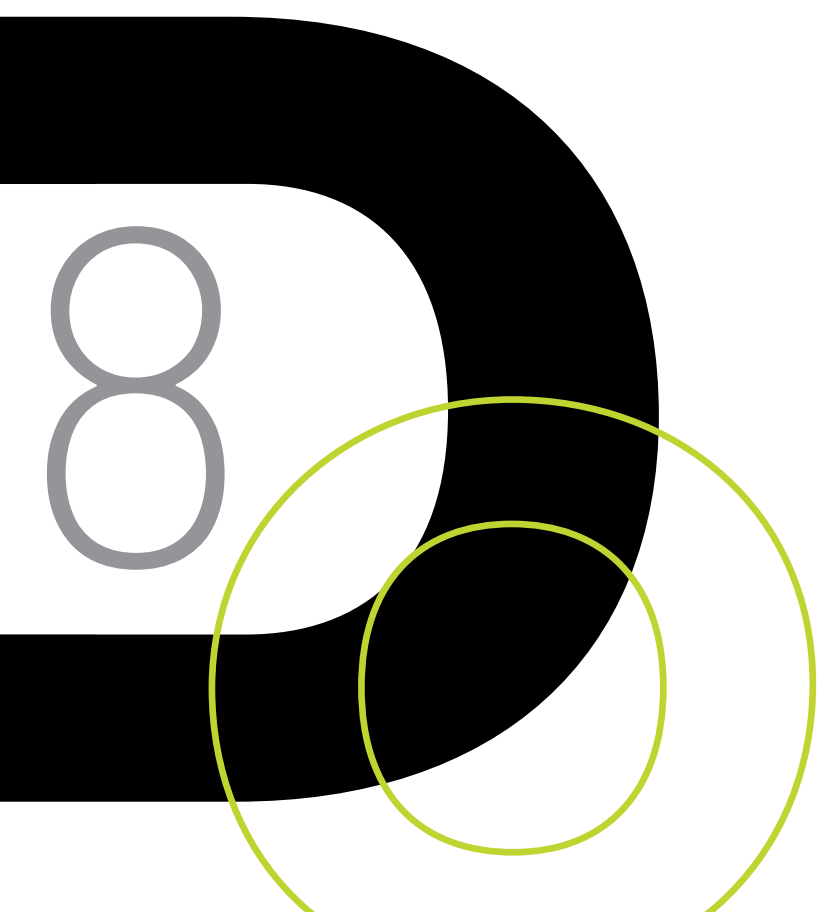
With our focus on applied learning, you'll put what you learn in the classroom into practice through work placements, overseas field schools, labs, field trips and, for performing arts students, the stage.

Driving change

With a desire to reduce poverty and improve well-being in developing countries, Shanjarika wanted to enrol in a university program to pursue a career in political science. But he also wanted to enter university fully prepared. Douglas College gave him that opportunity, offering an Associate of Arts Degree in Political Science with an option for university transfer after two years.

The program gave Shanjarika a solid foundation in topics like economics, history and political science, while preparing him for the complexities of post-secondary education in a supportive environment. He learned

everything from managing class attendance to completing assignments effectively, making his transition to university seamless.

"Douglas prepared me well," says Shanjarika, who has since transferred to SFU to complete a bachelor's degree in political science with a minor in economics. "The course notes I took during my time here have continued to help me with my current studies. Even just taking economics courses at Douglas gave me a head start on getting a minor in the same topic."

The knowledge gained through his degrees has given Shanjarika the foundation to establish Afrikan Identity,

an organization meant to empower African youth and educate them about their heritage.

"Douglas was more than just a stepping stone to my university studies. It showed me how important positive societal change can be," says Shanjarika. "It's why I plan to continue my advocating and lobbying efforts."

Setting the stage

Unsure of what she wanted to do after high school, Kiyomi turned her indecision into an opportunity to explore through Douglas College's Diploma in General Studies.

"At the time, I wasn't set on pursuing one particular goal," says Kiyomi. "I was interested in a wide variety of topics and wanted to try different classes to see what I liked best."

As a General Studies student, Kiyomi took courses in different areas of study while accumulating credits that transferred to programs at Douglas or many universities. This allowed her to take classes related to her dynamic set of hobbies, which include dancing, working out and

playing soccer. It also allowed her to experience different perspectives on psychology, gender studies, sport science and more.

While learning about each subject was compelling to Kiyomi, an introductory course on acting drew her in the most.

"I have always been passionate about storytelling and its ability to connect people around the world," says Kiyomi. "It's why acting and theatre interested me, but I was too hesitant to pursue it. General Studies made it possible for me to try it and gain the confidence to transition into a program I loved."

Now a graduate of the Diploma in Theatre with experience in

acting, including playing a lead in a production of *Orlando* at Douglas, Kiyomi plans to pursue a career in local theatre, film and television roles.

"It's nice how much flexibility comes with this career path," says Kiyomi. "I'm able to explore different options and can end up in directing or even instructing roles, something I'd like to consider down the road."

Taking the lead

Danna scoured her college viewbooks for schools that had a friendly, interconnected community. She found that at Douglas – plus many opportunities to contribute to the community herself.

Danna has been a director at the Douglas Students' Union, a Student Ambassador running events for prospective students, and a key player in hosting EDGE, an annual event for new students.

Her campus activities started with a simple conversation. Early in Danna's time at Douglas, she approached a Student Ambassador about their work. This inspired Danna to apply to become an ambassador herself.

"I jump on opportunities when I see them," Danna says. "Everything I've gotten involved with has been sparked by meeting people doing interesting things. Then, I learn more about these opportunities

and determine how I can become a meaningful part of them."

Danna's extracurriculars have also helped her gain valuable skills – such as decisiveness and flexibility – that she will put to good use when she becomes a nurse.

"Nurses have to think on their feet," Danna says. "Anything can go wrong at any time, and if it does, you need to find solutions fast because there are lives hanging in the balance. Events and community-building might not have the same stakes, but there's still an urgency that teaches you how to be adaptable."

Empowering education

When Chad enrolled at Douglas College, he found the support he needed to continue his studies to become a school district youth worker. It all started with sponsorship from his First Nation band.

"The sponsorship pays my tuition and covers a living and transportation allowance during the school year. I'm very fortunate and grateful for that," Chad says. "To be eligible, I took a learning and psych assessment. That taught me how I learn and what college resources are available to support me."

This new understanding allowed Chad to optimize his learning experience with support from Accessibility Services, enhancing his ability to focus in class. But Douglas's services offered more than just help with studies. They also created a sense of community.

"Having a space with Indigenous

Student Services to express myself and engage in Indigenous practices is very important to me," says Chad. "It helps that they always have events and can even offer their insight on accessibility."

With this support, Chad has felt encouraged to work towards giving students in similar situations the support they deserve.

"Everyone should make use of the services here," says Chad. "It's clear they want you to succeed, and I like seeing how I can play a similar role as a youth worker, supporting kids in school."

Getting into Douglas

GENERAL ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

To be admitted to Douglas, you must meet ONE of the following criteria:

- You completed high school or equivalent education, OR
- You are one course short of high school graduation or equivalent, OR
- You are 19 years old by the first day of classes, OR
- You are at least 17 years old on the first day of classes and have been out of high school for at least one year, OR
- You are a special needs student and have completed 12 years of study or have received an Evergreen or Leaving School Certificate

AND:
