Step 1: Research your options

Types of Institution

- Public Vs. Private
- Focus:
- a. Research university
- b. Regional university
- c. Liberal Arts College
- d. Technical or Arts Institute
- e. Special-focus
- f. Community college / junior college (2 year)

- Religious Affliated
- Single-gender
- Minority serving institutions
- a. Historically black colleges and universities (HBCU)
- b. Hispanic serving institutions (HIS)
- Asian American and Native American Pacific Islander-Serving Institutions (AANAPISI)
- d. Tribal colleges and universities



How to narrow your search – consider these factors

- Your academic profile (grades, test scores)
- Major/study options
- Location
- Size of campus
- Type of institution
- Financial aid available (if needed)
- Campus life and nearby activities








How to narrow your search

- Review university websites/social media
- Sign up on university "prospective lists" and attend their virtual or in-person events –
 "demonstrated interest"

Step 2: Finance your Studies

Undergraduate tuition at U.S. universities

Public Universities:

In-state tuition \$5,000-\$23,000 USD

Out-of-state or international tuition \$8,000-\$58,000 USD

Private Universities:
 Same tuition for all students:
 \$10,000 - \$70,000 USD

Cost of living (example, real total will vary)

Room (on or off campus)

Meals (meal plan or not)

Books

Health insurance

Other (transportation or personal expenses)

Total: \$10,000 - \$30,000/year



Funding options

- University financial aid
 - Merit scholarships based on grades, test scores, and/or holistic application review
 - Need-based grants based on your family's income and other financial measures; 50+ U.S. universities meet full demonstrated need for international students
 - Work-study may be part of a needs-based aid package
 - Athletic scholarships
 - Performing and fine arts scholarships
- Provincial Government loans and scholarships
- Personal and family finances, including Canadian bank loans

Merit Scholarship

- Available at any study level
- Could be based on:
- Grade average (GPA)
- Standardized test scores
- Leadership qualities
- Community service
- Overall strength of holistic applications
- Often your application serves as the scholarship application

Needs-based Financial Aid

- For undergraduates at select private universities
- 50+ meet full demonstrated needs
- Might include work-study
- Based on
- Family's income
- Other financial measures
- Americans
- Complete the FAFSA
- Can use government needs-based grants at any U.S. institutions



Register for the Eligibility Center – ncaa.org

Complete your 16 Core Courses

- 4 English (or first language French)
- 3 Math
- 2 Science
- 1 English, Math, or Science
- 2 Social Science
- 4 Additional courses (includes foreign language)

Maintain a 2.3 Grade Point Average (GPA)

Reach out to university coaches to be recruited

Maintain your amateur status

Performing and Fine Arts Scholarships

- For students pursuing a Bachelor's of Fine Arts (BFA), Master's of Fine Arts (MFA), or other professional arts programs (such as Bachelor's of Music)
- Requires an audition or portfolio
- O Requirements outlined in detail on the university's website
- Deadlines are typically earlier and may include a prescreening

Step 3: Complete your Application

Application Requirements

Application and fee

- Common App commonapp.org (1000+ schools)
- UCs, MIT, Georgetown, ApplyTexas, and many others have their own applications
- Application fees: ~\$30-100 USD
- Official transcripts from Grade 9 until the time you apply
 - Original document and English translation (if needed), uploaded by current counselor
- Standardized Tests
 - SAT/ACT (~2/3 of universities are test-optional)
 - TOEFL/IELTS/Duolingo (non-native English speakers)
 - If you took high school in English, likely exempt

Holistic review – other requirements you may expect

- Activities list extracurricular profile
- Recommendation Letters up to 3 required
 - 1 guidance counselor
 - 1-2 teachers
 - Up to 3 "other" letters electives teacher, coach, supervisor, religious leader, etc.
- Essays and writing supplements
 - Personal essay (up to 650 words)
 - University-specific supplements
- Possible optional/required items
 - Interview
 - Research abstract/maker profile
 - o Arts students: audition/portfolio
 - Graded paper

Application Timeline (Grade 12)

- August: Applications open
- Oct-Nov: Early application deadlines
- Dec: Early decisions released
- Nov-Feb: Regular application deadlines
- Mar-Apr: Regular decisions released
- May 1: Decisions due







Application Types

- Restrictive Early Action (REA)
- Non-binding
- Restrictions are specified to the institution
- Decisions in Dec Feb
- Early Decisions (ED,ED1,ED2)
- Binding contract
- Only 1 US school
- ED1 decision in Dec
- ED2 decision in Feb
- Early Action (EA)
- Non-binding
- Can apply to multiple schools
- Decisions by April 1st


- Regular Decision (RD)
- non-binding
- Can apply to multiple schools
- Decisions by April 1st
- Rolling Admission
- Non-binding
- Ongoing review
- Decisions can be received within days/weeks
