Thieves at Work at Central

It is with great frustration that I have to report to parents and the Central community that out school has been the victim of copper thieves for the second time this year. In early September we had several copper ventilation pipes stolen from the roof of our school. The holes and subsequent rain led to thousands of dollars in water damage to our library and surrounding rooms. The damage was covered by School district insurance but that is money that would be better spent on resources for students. On Wednesday, October 10th our school was targeted again as thieve stole more copper pipes and copper drains. Fortunately we were able to identify the theft and make repairs before the rain set in. If you live around the school property and you see any suspicious activity please call the police immediately. There is increased security and police presence in the evenings but extra vigilance on the part of parents and

neighbours could help stop this from happening again.

Dear Parents,

Re: Appropriate Halloween Costumes:

Halloween is fast approaching and once again Children of the Street Society is raising awareness about inappropriate Halloween costumes, which glamorize the sexual exploitation of children and youth, the gang lifestyle and costumes which sexualize children and youth.

Dressing up as a "*pimp*" or "*ho*" glamorizes the sexual exploitation of children and youth, which is a form of abuse and modern day slavery. In reality, the sexual exploitation of children and youth leads to multiple, long-term disadvantages to the victim including homelessness, mental illness, drug and/or alcohol addiction, sexually transmitted infections, HIV and AIDS, drug affected babies, post traumatic stress syndrome from physical, emotional and sexual abuse, social stigma, and barriers to future employment.

Recruiters often attempt to lure children and youth by making false promises and offering gifts or intangible things such as popularity, love, and belonging. Children and youth can be recruited *anywhere*, including school grounds, shopping malls, and online through social networking sites and chat rooms.

Once again this year, the Society would like to take this message one step further. Not only are we asking the community to be socially responsible by wearing Halloween costumes which do not glamorize the sexual exploitation of our children and youth, we're also asking children, youth and adults to take the notion of social responsibility one step further by not wearing costumes which glamorize the gang lifestyle.

With troubling similarities between recruitment into a life of sexual exploitation, youth who are recruited into the gang lifestyle are also made false promises of money, power, respect, a sense of family, and protection – promises which lead to violence, criminal activity, and the risk of death. The issues of sexual exploitation and gangs not only have similarities, they can also be connected. Girls can play a variety of roles in a gang, including participating in criminal activity, and being sexually exploited by male gang members.

This year, the message is simple: it's not socially acceptable to dress up as a 'pimp,' gangster, or sex trade worker this Halloween. Earning a profit off of the buying and selling of children and youth, glamorizing the sex trade or a gangster lifestyle, is only further contributing to our false perceptions about these harsh realities.

Please encourage your school community to choose socially responsible Halloween costumes that do not glamorize the sexual exploitation of children and youth, sexualize young people, or glamorize gang involvement. Instead, please encourage children and youth to choose appropriate costumes that represent their own individuality and creativity.

Children of the Street Society is a provincial Society and federal Charity dedicated to the prevention of sexual exploitation of children and youth since 1995. The Society's mission is to take a proactive approach through public awareness, education and early intervention strategies to prevent the sexual exploitation of children and youth while offering support to families. Dear Parents and Guardians,

Recently we lost a member of our school community. Amanda Todd was a Grade 10 student at CABE, and we all grieve her loss. We now know the story of Amanda and her struggles in dealing with bullying. As you can imagine, this is a very difficult time for Amanda's loved ones and for many members of our community. We extend our heartfelt condolences to Amanda's family and those touched by this tragedy.

Suicide is a complex issue that involves many contributing factors. We know that bullying can elevate the risk of suicide in those young people who are already vulnerable. We also know that we're in a critical period when high profile trauma intensifies already existing symptoms. This can contribute to an increase in suicidal thoughts among these vulnerable students.

Awareness and education are key to preventing bullying. As parents, it is important that you watch for changes in your child's behavior and signs of stress. Open dialogue with your child is critical to supporting them. We ask that you talk to them about bullying, appropriate internet use and how they are feeling. If you are concerned about your child's welfare please talk to a school staff member or seek help from other community support services.

I encourage you to review the following resources:

As a School District we will continue to follow up on every reported case of bullying and attempt to seek resolutions. We will also continue to use a variety of programming to raise awareness of the issue and the supports available. Staff will be watchful for signs of increased anxiety.

In addition, we are looking at ways to work with the broader community to increase dialogue about a collaborative approach to this serious issue. Let's hope that Amanda's legacy will be that bullying of any kind will not be tolerated and that caring people banding together can have a positive impact on their community.
