

Viruses in school computers not a major threat

Viral infections have been detected in the computer systems of Gleneagle. According to **Jodie Udell**, Computer Studies Department Head, and **Stan Marshall**, Information Technologist, these viruses are nothing more than an annoyance.

"The problem that we have at Gleneagle is not at all serious," said Udell. Gleneagle, has been infected with a number of viruses since last November. These common viruses have infected the networks at Gleneagle and can be received from anywhere. They are also responsible for a few minor problems in the computers including random reboots, Microsoft Office products not loading properly, and some data corruption.

"Students should not be worried about corruption of data," said Marshall, "because in 99.9% of the corruption cases, we can recover your file without problems."

According to Udell, the viruses were most likely carried on disk from one computer to another or via email attachments.

To counter these viruses, a computer has been set up in the library to scan disks. "It is impossible for us to solve the virus problems at Gleneagle," said Marshall, "the only real way that the problem can be solved is if students check their own disks for viruses because, in most cases, a virus may be on a disk without the user knowing."

The school has not been able to exterminate these viruses, because the majority of the computer systems are not equipped with a virus check program. According to Marshall, when the network was first being built, the idea of every computer being equipped with a virus scan was not feasible, because of budget constraints.

"If every computer were to be equipped with a virus scanner, it would be expensive, and the computers would boot up much more slowly," said Udell. Only the important areas of the school including the server and the schools office computers, are scanned once a week.

"It comes down to convenience," says Udell, "to run a virus scan every time at start-up slows all the computers down." The only real method to get rid of these viruses, according to Marshall, is daily virus scanning.

Udell says, "Even though we have a virus problem here, Gleneagle is one of the luckier schools. Riverside was hit badly with viruses. They wiped their entire computer network out." Both Udell and Marshall say that students should not worry, for as long as these viruses stay harmless then there is very little chance of any real data loss.

Over the past six months hundreds of immigrants have risked their lives travelling in rusty ships and cargo crates from China to Canada. Each brings along different preconceived ideas about Canada.

Promises of a land filled with easy riches and endless opportunities prompt their long and dangerous bi-continent journey. They expect a perfect carefree world but Canada is hardly carefree. The real Canada has drug problems, homeless people and is sometimes economically unstable. Instead of finding the best of Canada they stumble blindly into the darkest

Those who are released by the authorities often face having to pay off \$40,000 debts to those who brought them over. These "snake heads" are gang members who promise the misinformed immigrants riches, but instead show them a life filled with crime and danger. Debts are paid usually through illegal means because the migrants are forced into gangs. Years of drug dealing and prostitution dwindle their debts until the refugees know no other life.

Who do we blame for these "snake heads" taking advantage of the immigrants? The Canadian and Chinese governments are to blame. Our government provides a safe haven for these activities and shouldn't be surprised when these migrants turn to crime to pay off their debts. 



There were different photographers for the grad pictures almost every day for the nine days of the pictures.


Christine Garret, make-up and hair stylist said, "The work is fun but the day is a long one."

Upper-cafeteria closed due to 'servicing'

Hanging on the door that blocks the staircase to the balcony above the cafeteria, is a sign that says "Closed for servicing." Despite this sign, no service is going on.

Ken Lemmen, vice principal, says that the balcony was closed around November 15 due to, "A number of students not behaving appropriately, throwing food and cups."

Lemmen was notified of the disturbance from a noon hour supervisor, a caretaker, and a couple of cafeteria workers.

For the first two weeks of November, Lemmen tried to make vis-

its and talk to students about the misbehaviour, but he felt it didn't make any difference.

Carolyn Gielen, grade 12, feels the school designers should have anticipated this behaviour.

She says, "If anybody was initially worried about flying objects from higher elevations, then they should have made the whole school one level!"

When asked if the balcony will ever be reopened, Lemmen said, "That area is essentially overflow for the multipurpose room if it gets crowded....the number of students [using the cafeteria] doesn't seem to justify opening it."

The group's first meeting, for all interested students, will be February 17 at 3:30p.m. in room 204.









According to Rick Thompson, team coach, the team will finish fourth or fifth if the girls play


The team is made up of nine players from grades 11 and 12, one of which is currently out




