Principal's Message

What I Learned

On the October 23 Provincial Pro-D Day, I attended the Encompass Conference on Social Responsibility. Michele Borba, the keynote speaker, talked to us about steps to creating a socially responsible human being. This is what she said about what good schools do to be intentional in teaching social responsibility:

- T Target (know what you stand for)
- E Exemplify (be a role model, provide examples)
- A Atmosphere (create a climate of care)
- C- Compassion (mobilize kids' hearts)
- H Habits (teach habits)

Real social responsibility is not just having kids tell us what respect means but having kids ask "what do I do" and then do it. This newsletter issue shares acts of caring by our school community.

I also attended a cyberbullying workshop which shared research on social responsibility on the internet. The findings show that cyberbullying/online aggression is more likely to happen if the computer is in the child's bedroom. Parents can talk with children about how safe and responsible internet use is part of being information and media literate as well as keep the computer in a public area of the house. The **TRI-CITY EAGLES FIELD HOCKEY CLUB** has offered a field hockey program to younger players since 1991. The Spring program runs for approximately 10 weeks from April through until the end of June. There is a mini program for those with 2000 to 2003 birth dates, and a junior program for those with 1992 to 1999 birth dates.

U-11 to U-18 teams compete in the Greater Vancouver Junior Field Hockey League and the program cost is \$115. The Club's Mini program is designed to introduce younger players to the sport and the rules and field size are modified. Season fee is \$100 per participant for the Mini program and space is limited.

Players must first register with Field Hockey BC to gain insurance coverage and a player membership number. Under 11 and 12 players pay \$15 while U-13 to U-18 pay \$43. Without the player membership number, registration with our Club cannot be finalized.
