Environmental Science Consultant Master's in Environmental Resource Studies

Aims to bridge Indigenous and Western knowledge systems.

- Views on Indigenous Knowledge in Science
- Indigenous Knowledge sustained communities for millennia.
- Emphasizes balance, spirituality, and respect for creation.
- Science is lived and practiced daily, not separated into parts.
- Knowledge is passed through land-based learning and oral traditions.
- Current Work
- Works in education to help integrate Indigenous perspectives.
- Uses ceremonies and guiding principles in teaching.
- Focuses on sustainability for future generations (e.g., clean water, healthy environment).

## Mountains to Ocean summer program <a href="https://ocean.org/mountains-to-ocean/">https://ocean.org/mountains-to-ocean/</a>

- An immersive 3-week long program for participants to learn about the interconnectedness of the land and ocean around Vancouver, BC.
- Mountains to Ocean is a program designed to immerse youth ages 15-21 into Vancouver, BC's one-of-a-kind coastal landscape and connect them to other young leaders in their communities.
- While learning about environmental stewardship with hands-on learning activities and projects, youth will be inspired to tackle pressing oceanic and climate challenges like plastic pollution, climate change, and habitat loss.
- Participants will complete an individual project to demonstrate that taking action in their everyday lives can make a difference. This action project is designed to motivate other youth to become environmental stewards and leaders, bringing their communities along in the effort to protect the planet.
- This part-time program takes place on evenings and weekends, requiring a 25-35 hour time commitment. There is no cost to program participants.

- Cohort: July 10th-July 31st
- Online orientation- July 10th (evening) Excursions- July 14th, 15th, and 16th
- Application Deadline: July 3rd, 2025 (11:59pm PST)
- The keystone component of each cohort will be a threeday outdoor learning experience called a learning journey.
- During these learning journeys, youth will connect to the forests and ocean of BC while learning from community partners about the importance of protecting and restoring our environment.
- This main experience is bookended by an online orientation call a few days prior to the first learning journey, and after attending the learning journey, youth will be given various options to complete their own action project over the following two weeks.
