Social Responsibility Goal: Contributing to Classroom and Community

Creating a Culture of Caring and Connectedness is something we work at within the classroom and as a school community.

The presenter at a recent workshop, Colleen Drobot, talked about the importance of children feeling connected to their families, classmates and some important adults around the school. This helps them navigate tough times.

Programs that teachers use in class vary often, even from year to year, depending on the group.

Roots of Empathy is one program that is featured in primary classes, taught in Div. 18 by a fabulous volunteer. This sets the stage for years to come! Other programs taught by Mrs. Flood, our school counsellor, including Friends, which is also presented to larger groups or whole

classes.

In intermediate grades, our students are often asked to take on positions of leadership. Many of the Grade 4 and 5 students are lunch monitors this year for the first term. They have done an excellent job of modeling appropriate classroom and playground behaviour for their young charges. In many instances, a parent of a younger child tells me that the child sought out their classroom monitor to help out with an issue or an injury. What great feedback! Our Grade 4s and 5s are truly STARS in our eyes!

This year we have had three divisions step up to be leaders in our community. Division 5 recently completed a Food bank drive

and Division 7 has just announced a Blanket drive, perfectly timed with our cool weather.

Our Leadership Group is working on our Rainy Day Games Club with PAC support and soon Later on we will have our Christmas Concert Food Drive that will help replenish the cupboards at Share after the Christmas rush. They have really enjoyed creating Fill Me Up bucket posters that you will find around the school.

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School Goals: Improve Reading Comprehension

Tips for Reading To Children

Reading material for this experience can be at any level of difficulty; from very easy to quite sophisticated.

- ☐ Read daily to your child and choose a time that suits your family schedule.
- ☐ Make this a joyful and relaxing experience in a comfortable and cozy place.
- ☐ Be playful, enthusiastic, and expressive as you read.
- ☐ To captivate your child's interest and activate prior knowledge, read titles and look at pictures before reading.
- ☐ Model a sense of curiosity and wonder about pictures and ideas as you are reading using

- prompts such as: I wonder why . . . Isn't this interesting . . . This makes me think about . . . or Wow . . .
- ☐ Be willing to stop for discussions and answer questions your child might have. This will happen quite naturally.
- ☐ Share ideas, feelings, and thoughts with your child and help make connections between their own life and what you are reading.
- ☐ Encourage your child to visualize and act out parts of the story. This helps the stories come alive.
- ☐ Use your finger to track words as you read. This reinforces reading left to right, top to bottom, and helps to develop the

- concept of matching the spoken word to the printed word. Sometimes children want to take responsibility for doing the finger tracking themselves.
- ☐ Consider using bookmarks and pointers to vary the tracking process.
- □ Don't discourage your child from asking to have their favourite stories read over and over again. When children no longer have to concentrate on the plot, they naturally focus on the flow of language and memorize words.

And finally...

☐ Read what your child and you are interested in.

Winter Weather ahead!

Schools are not routinely closed due to snow or other weather conditions. All schools in the Coquitlam School District will remain OPEN, if at all possible, during winter weather, including snowfall.


Some of our schools are in very different climate zones from one another and there may be the need for select closings within the district. If there is a partial closure of schools within the district, these individual schools will be identified.

On occasion, full district or partial district closure is required.

Extreme weather can also impact transit busing. Bus schedules may face significant changes or cancellations due to the weather conditions. Parents seeking information on transit bus schedules need to consult the Translink website: http://www.translink.ca/ Any district-wide or partial closure will be decided by 6:30 a.m. at the latest and will be announced via **School District 43: website** www.sd43.bc.ca and CKNW AM 980 radio, CKWX 1130 radio and CBC (690) radio.

The decision on schools remaining open or needing to be closed, because of extreme weather, occurs before 6:30 a.m. so that families can plan and make alternate arrangements, should schools be closed. While the District tries to make the best decision with the information available, the weather changes quickly and therefore decisions to stay at home during challenging weather conditions should be made by each family.

We encourage families to continuously check the School District 43 website for updates and changes, as well as the above identified radio stations.

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Student leadership at Irvine


Earlier this month the Grade Four and Five Leadership club took on the <u>fun Mustache project</u>. Before that they filled the school with STARS posters

Worrisome Parking and Handicap Parking Lots

You have surely noticed that our school has grown, as has our staff. Please use public, street parking rather than the staff parking lot. Thanks for your help.

As reported in previous editions, the parent and staff parking lots continue to be areas of concern before and after school.

We have a number of HANDICAPPED parking spots, two in the staff lot and one in the parent lot. In addition, a few summers ago, a handicapped access was identified along the Renton side of the school fence near the daycare building. Please respect these spots and do not park

there without a valid permit.

Many people have noted children, from toddlers to Grade Five students walking through the parking lots just before and after the bell, rather than using the paths provided. We have noted toddlers running ahead of parents and are concerned that someone will be hurt. Please use either the new path along the Wellington side of our parking lot or the sidewalk along the dropoff lot, or the cement pathway along the front of the school.

In addition, we would like to encourage

everyone to use the crosswalks as it is very unsafe to make the quick dash across the road outside of those protected areas.

Once again, I would like to remind parents and drivers not to park along the school side of Renton, and leave their vehicles. It is a City of Port Coquitlam bylaw that designates this area as a no parking zone. Fine is \$100. Please respect the bylaws and our neighbours.

Parent to Parent:

Tips for Helping your child be a better Bystander that have come out of recent conversations with parents here at school.

Research says that 57% Bullying incidents stop when the Bystanders act in a positive way. It also says that family dinner is a great spot for this subject to be discussed!

How can a parent help?

- ⇒ <u>Talk</u> with your child at dinner about their day and <u>listen carefully</u> to the adventures that happen throughout the day.
- ⇒ Talk about how they could help support a sibling or a friend through a tough time in a positive manner. Think of creative solutions together!
- ⇒ I CARE important points:
 - -Creative problem solving (can you help think of new ways for your child to wiggle out of a tight spot?)

Jan. 5:

- -Ask for help from friends or an adult
- -Relate and join (ask the child to join in with them to get them out of a tight spot)
- -Empathy: comfort a friend and understand
- ⇒ Ask your child about what else they could do, or do better next time
- ⇒ Bullying is about using power to cause distress to others. It happens repeatedly, over a period of time, rather than only once.
- ⇒ Parents play an important role in helping their children work through these issues because they occur in many situations: school, home/daycare, sports or play.
