McFaul's Chat and Chew: Report Cards: The Kitchen Table Talk

You just received the Term One Report Card for your child and what will you do with this document? This was a question that I asked of my Community Circle Group last Friday as we were preparing our students to bring home their first communication of the year and their answers were fascinating. There was discussion from the kids who stated that they like report cards because they got paid for A's and B's earned on their report. There was the idea of, if the report was good then the child would proudly share; however, if the report was not up to expectations then they would place the report in an obscure place hoping to delay the inevitable discussion with the disappointed parent. One sharing was that there would be no discussion about the comments or letter grades as long as there were good marks there was no need to discuss. I shuddered at this thought, pondering what a missed learning opportunity to sit down and have a shared discussion about successes and challenges presented by the teachers.

I view the bringing home of the report card as an opportunity to teach family expectations and establish immediate goals for improvements and continued successes. I picture a Norman Rockwell type vignette, with a clear kitchen table, maybe the odd coffee mug and two adults sitting around the table balanced on each side of their child with the focus of each set of eyes zeroing in on the report card. The shoulders of each parent is turned slightly towards the child, a loving touch of reassurance is placed onto the child's back and heads are nodding while the child speaks on his/her behalf about a plan. Questions are posed such as; How do you feel about the comments and evaluations presented in this report? ... or, What are you most proud of sandwiched together, with, what would you wish to change by the next report? Congratulations are offered on achievements and goal setting is established to breakdown big challenges in to small manageable tasks with target dates and review periods. A sense of satisfaction appears on the face of the child doing and performing their best within the difficulties and demands of managing school, outside interests, parent work and all of the social emotional challenges that impact our worlds.

Each and every one of you has established a routine to acknowledge the quality work that your child is producing and demonstrating from their soccer goals to their singing recitals. We ask that the sharing of the report card reading be done together. Be done with a culture of recognizing the highs and the lows and that each word and every letter grade is dissected with a sense of purpose. When sharing thoughts; express that every learning assignment is a celebration of their growth and an identification of the type of creativity chosen and shown in their work. A sense of reflection is applied to all course comments that require the student to clearly label action plans and identify explicit behaviours that they can freely implement on their own behalf. This enables them to be the directors, architects and owners of their achievements along with the guiding hand and reassuring words from you telling them to aim higher, persevere longer and believe in their talents.

So, be it a kitchen table or the two front seats of your car, please create the environment that has the two of you placed side by side working shoulder to shoulder. These are the key first steps in supporting the growth and change that the family group has worked out together in order to build a plan that allows your child to be proud of a report card that meets their needs, pushes their abilities and reflects their challenges.

Culture Beat: Events and Activities.

Monty Explorations - Every day at Monty during blocks one, two, three, or four students go with fellow students from their team to explorations, Art, Home Ec., Music, or Tech Ed.

This term in Art Grade 8 students are working with water colours; learning different techniques like wet on dry and wet on wet water painting. They started the term with mixing and creating colours using primary water colours. Most recently they drew self-portraits using only letters from their names which are currently being displayed in the hallway in front of the gym. At this time students are painting their names with warm and cool colours, and starting their string art project. In Home Ec. students are sewing pajama pants learning simple stitches and how to thread their own sewing machines. In the near future they will move into the cooking room where they will learn to make simple and nutritious foods.

In Tech Ed. Grade 6 and 7 Students are currently building wooden basketball courts, and previously were building rockets that they launched into the sky with air pressure. In Music, grade 6 and 7 students are performing Rocking Robin for the rest of the class using guitars. Next week they will begin practicing their rock band performance for the school at the end of the term in January.

I love explorations, and my favorite part this year is working in the Art room doing winter string art, and making gumball machines in grade 8 tech ed.

This **brand new program** being offered at the Family Resource Centre, located in Minnekhada Middle School in Port Coquitlam will suit students in Middle School who are struggling to complete assignments and classroom subject matter. Students that have trouble organizing, tracking, understanding instruction, need help to begin and work through assignments, and need support with learning how to tackle home assignments are best suited for this program. Program facilitator is Alida Noort, a trained Multisensory Tutor, SEA, and Program Developer for the Family Resource Centre.

This program will run in ½ hour time blocks with a maximum of 2 students per block, on Tuesdays and Thursdays beginning at 5:15 P.M. Program start date is Tuesday, January 7, 2014 and runs through May 29, 2014. Students will be given individual help, with an understanding that parents will be actively involved keeping the facilitator up to date on all classroom subject matter that the student needs help with. Communication among parents, students, and facilitator is the key to the success of this program.

Fees are paid monthly, <u>all</u> post-dated cheques to be submitted with registration. First month's fees are due with registration and are **NON-REFUNDABLE.** A 30 day notice of withdrawal is a requirement of this program. Cost per session is \$22.00.
