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#### McFaul's Chat and Chew: Embracing Failure

We have heard the American educational lament from their presidents and educational leaders over the past few years that, "failure is not an option." Our kids have heard this statement also and it has trickled into their psyche; whereby, they believe that failure is not good and that they should not desire to experience failure nor participate in an activity that may result in some level of failure. This kind of thinking is prevalent in some of the simplest daily type of interactions and it can have great impact upon experiential learning. I have shared with students the idea that failure is a normal part of any type of learning and that it is actually the best teacher, as failure will provide feedback as to what Is not working. We as educators see students who attempt to apply the same strategy to solving a problem with no change in the details or the variables, time and time again. The challenge may be small in nature; like opening their lock or complex as transitioning through different friendships. Inevitably the student applies the same strategy over and over again with the final product resulting in a closed lock and an under-appreciated relationship. Changing one of the variables in any problem solving allows one to learn through trial and error. Oops... there is that idea again, failure - error or mistake and when some kids hear that refrain they move into protective mode possibly using social shut down or deflecting energy or blame on to other extraneous factors.

Failure is one of the most basic instructional components of life and we need to honour the process of failure, accept it for the inherent value of teaching what to do and eliminating what not to do. We need to encourage kids to try once again to complete their challenge ask them to rethink the parts of their

solutions and to celebrate that every time they refine their ideas they are narrowing the problem to its core components. They are working through failure to discover learning.

This year I hope that you hear the words from our staff and our students that sounds like this,' My first idea was too vague" or "my initial answer needed to be more specific" and possibly, "I have to come up with another idea." Some simple phrases that help change the mindset that failure is normal and that it is part of everyday learning, for if it were not then our children would still be crawling to school afraid to risk the idea of every walking on two feet in case they might fail by falling or banging into the furniture. We want to help kids deal with their failure, their falling and they must have the right attitude to accept the fall and then to get back up and try again when the problems are more complex like, dividing fractions or writing a topic sentence.

The dedicated work that was put forth by Ms. Sky Ashmore and her team of support was assaulted with the crime of breaking and entering the bin and theft of \$4000.00 - \$5000.00 worth of safety ad survivor goods. Ms. Ashmore worked throughout the year to re-stock and supply the container for our school needs. The PAC worked extra hard to ensure the safety of this valuable bin by moving its position to be more visible and by installing a stand along alarm. The individuals who did this crime are professional and knowledgeable about the use of these bins and only removed the hardware items that have resale value versus the soft items like water, toilet paper and plastic bags. Our PAC will be reforming its approach to how best to re-stock these stolen supplies of shovels, hammers, propane tanks, sport canopies, emergency radios, portable fold away toilets and other significant hardware. Your support in this area of either donating goods of this nature and volunteering time to help in the re-supplying of the container would be greatly appreciated.

- 1. To order your Smile Cards just click the link at the bottom titled, "Order Smile Cards Here". You will be directed to an email message where you need to include the following information:
  - 1. your name;
  - 2. the number of cards you would like to receive and;
  - **3**. your child's name (teacher &/or division if you know it) so we can send the cards home with your child.

Or; if you prefer, you can contact the program coordinator by phone or email below, as well.

\*\*Remember to ask your neighbours, friends and relatives, if they too would like to help generate funds for our school, by having their own Smile Cards. Or; maybe you want to load a card and give it as a gift...*Christmas is coming!* 

- Once you receive your Smile Card, it can be loaded at ANY Thrifty Foods store, at the Customer Service counter or through a cashier using your debit card, credit card or cash. If you choose to load your card through a cashier, please note that it will be a separate transaction and MUST be done prior to ringing through your groceries.
- 3. Use your card to pay for your purchases at **ANY** Thrifty Foods store! Keep it safe it represents CASH and re-load it when it is empty! **ALWAYS ASK FOR YOUR CARD BACK.**

Sometimes cashiers will assume you no longer need the card if it is empty. Only cards issued through our school (electronically attached to Montgomery Middle) will benefit our school.

If you should happen to lose your Smile Card once it is loaded, contact Thrifty Foods ASAP so that your lost card can be "frozen".
