#### McFaul's Chat and Chew: Wonder, Our School Read Aloud.

Classes have been listening to their teacher share the book titled, **Wonder**, by R.J. Palacio over the past two months as a class read aloud. The book has received numerous awards and recognition from literary circles as a book that supports our goal of enhancing the Social Emotional Learning of our students. The character named Auggie, enters school for the first time in Gr. 5 after dealing with a lifetime of surgeries and medical setbacks due to an unusual facial disfiguration that has overtime resulted in a lessening of his overall self-confidence and sense of self-esteem. The book travels through the journey of Auggie going to school, making new acquaintances and being challenged by inquiring stares and abrupt questions that he has avoided for most of his life due to his sheltered protection by his family and close friends. As a reader and listener we get to see what his life is like from his perspective and most importantly we get to see the replay of actions and events from the eyes of the characters who become part of Auggie's supportive world. Through these challenges we are able to share with our students the various thoughts and perspectives that shape and cloud our line of thinking and moral reasoning. The discussions stem from the ideas of precepts, which are statements of truth about really important things. These precepts are shared by one of the books teachers, Mr. Browne, and place for the reader a thought provoking statement to challenge the reader to look beyond their world. For all involved to see that events are and can be understood from multiple perspectives and they are real and true depending upon the view one is happening to see at that moment.

We all know that pre-adolescence are times of developing ones sense of self and for shaping the influential power of one's peers; however, through the dialogue of the book we as a staff at Monty are able to blend the typical dilemmas of middle school; like friendships, bullying, peer power and social acceptance into our daily discussions and into our Community Circle Groups. I encourage you to take some time at a dinner conversation to ask your child about the book **Wonder**, and ask them for their short synopsis about the storyline and their thoughts about some of the key precepts in the book, those being;

#### When given the choice between being right or being kind, choose kind. ---Dr. Wayne Dyer

#### Your deeds are your monuments. --- Egyptian Inscription on a Tomb

Ask them how do these statements apply to their world and can they identify times and events in their life whereby they can share examples of when they chose kindness over being right or actions that define who they are as growing young citizens.

**Middle Years Development Instrument** – The Middle Years Development Instrument (MDI) is a self-report questionnaire that our Gr. 7 students will undertake this November. The purpose of our study is to understand how children during the middle childhood years think and feel about their lives both inside and outside of school by having children complete. The Middle Years Development Instrument survey (MDI). This study is one of the first of its kind taking place in Canada. The information collected from this study will help inform educational and community efforts to improve the lives of children. You have the right to withdraw your child from the research at any time. Two weeks ago you received information through an email sent to you and IF YOU DONOT HAVE EMAIL PLEASE PHONE THE OFFICE AND WE WILL GET A hard copy of the information and a withdraw form if you choose not to have your child participate. The information is anonymous and pertains primarily to neighbourhhood trends in which the school district can help respond to these neighbourhood challenges through program planning and resource sharing. ### KID'S CHRISTMAS/HOLIDAY MARKET 2013



Everything you see and hear helps. Note the physical characteristics and clothing of individuals. If you see automobiles, jot down license plate numbers.



This letter follows up on a combined commitment from community agencies, municipalities and the School District to keep our children and youth safe in our communities. Kevin Cameron from

the Canadian Center for Threat Assessment and Trauma Response recently spoke to a group of 250 parents in Coquitlam. Kevin reminded us that good parenting, open communication, building

loving, trusting relationships with our kids and listening more than talking **will** trump the social media challenges parents often face with their children, every time. Kevin will be returning to the

Tri-Cities on the evenings of February 4th and May 15, 2014. Please mark those dates in your calendar and further details will follow at a later date.

#### Cyberspace Bullying (tips developed from www.prevnet.ca) :

• The majority of youth who are victimized through electronic bullying do not report this bullying

to an adult. Students are more likely to report electronic bullying to parents than teachers, but

fear that their online privileges may be revoked as a result.

We need to make it clear that online and cell phone privileges will not be revoked if electronic bullying is reported, and we need to be sure to ask our kids about their online lives, friend them on their networks and know and use the same technology that they know and use.

• 57% of the youth who are bullied electronically confide in an online friend, but fewer than 9%

inform an adult.

We need to work harder at building trust with our children/youth/students so that they will tell us when they read something online that worries them, and we need to tell them and show them

that we are here to help.

#### • So, what do you do?


**TALK** to your kids and tell them you will help , promise not to make matters worse and promise

October 24, 2013 CHAIR: Dear Staff, Melissa Hyndes From October 29, 2013 to November 28, 2013, the Board of Education and the Coquitlam School District is embarking on a community engagement process for the Learning, Land and VICE-CHAIR: Neighbourhoods initiative. Holly Butterfield Over the next decade, we can expect the number of children in our kindergarten to grade 12 education system to increase by approximately 5,000 students, with much of the growth concentrated in areas such as Burke Mountain and Port Moody. TRUSTEES: We are planning for that growth now by building new schools and refurbishing and adding to other ones, so we can continue to provide fair, accessible and quality education for all students and a Gail Alty better working environment for our employees. We are also reviewing how we manage our land John J. Keryluk assets to better support the growing need. Through the Learning, Land and Neighbourhoods initiative, four properties are under consideration Brian Robinson to determine if we are making the best use of them or if there are other ways in which we can Judy Shirra maximize their value for students today and in the future: Coronation Park Elementary School - Closed in 2005, this school sits empty, is in very poor Diane Sowden condition and is not expected to be needed for educational purposes. Gerri Wallis Moody Elementary School – Built in the 1950's for approximately 250 students, this school is in very poor condition and is on a small site. With expected enrolment of close to 450 by 2026, the Keith Watkins existing school will not meet the needs of the community. A portion of Parkland Elementary site - This process is a continuation from last year. The Board has approved the sale of this property; however, the zoning application requires further consultation with the public. A portion of Victoria Park – The District owns nine lots which adds up to .83 acres. This used to be a school site until 1968. It is currently used as a park and we do not expect to use this site for any future educational purposes. On behalf of the Board of Education, I invite you to get involved in this dialogue. As employees of the school district, your unique perspectives and ideas will help deepen our collective understanding of the challenges and opportunities. Your advice will help guide the Board's decisions and actions. I have enclosed the community engagement schedule; you can also go online to www.sd43.bc.ca/landmngmt for more information. You talk.
