It is through our Parent Advisory Council (P.A.C.) that we as a school are able to purchase and extend our financial support to the various programs that we offer in our community.

The PAC has established as their major fundraiser, the Spring Raffle Tickets. This is a community event which involves all partner groups. We need you to support your child and help them to complete sales of their assigned Raffle Tickets. How you do this level of support can be as creative as our minds are capable of being – you may help by selling tickets at your work, you may encourage your child to phone relatives, friends and others to entice them into a fundraiser that directly supports our school needs, you may spend a body of time with them supporting their sales at your local high volume shopping area. Enrollment Documentation Request:

Following a recent enrolment audit, every school in our district has been requested to comply with recent changes in the documentation required to enrol a student in the B.C. Public Education System. A recent file review has determined that a large percentage of our student files do not currently contain the proper documentation. This process is especially important to our Grade 8 students moving on to secondary schools in the district.

Specifically we are required to place a copy of each of the following in each student's file:

- 1. Proof of Parents Status in Canada (Citizenship, Permanent Resident, Refugee Status or Visa).
 - a. This is required as a student's eligibility for provincial education funding is actually based on the citizenship status of their parents.
- 2. Proof of Child's Citizenship (Citizenship, Permanent Resident, Refugee Status or Visa).
- 3. Proof of Residency in British Columbia.

If you have completed this process in past years, we thank you. If you are unsure, please call the office and we can let you know if documentation is missing. We will be calling our grade 7 and 8 parents over the next few weeks to let you know if we need further information.

DOCUMENTATION REQUIRED FOR REGISTRATION OF ALL SCHOOL AGE STUDENTS FUNDING ELIGIBILITY CHECKLIST (January 15,2014)

In accordance with the School Act Section 82 and Ministry of Education policy, a student is eligible for a provincially funded education if parent(s) or legal guardian(s) meet residency requirements. Students who are ordinarily resident in BC and whose parent or legal guardian is ordinarily resident in BC and who are enrolled in a program in School District No. 43 (Coquitlam) are eligible for Ministry funding.

PARENT STATUS IN CANADA - Required of the parent or legal guardian

Canadian passport
Canadian Citizenship card
Confirmation of Landing/Permanent Residence (8-1/2 x 14" sheet) and passport
Permanent Resident Card (front and back)

CHILD STATUS IN CANADA - Required of the child

- □ If a child is accompanying a parent on Work or Study Permit, provide copy of child or parent permit that <u>indicates child accompanying</u>.

RESIDENCY

Parent or legal guardian must be ordinarily resident in British Columbia with a sufficient degree of Continuity to ensure that there is a settled purpose other than to obtain free public education
