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McFaul's Chat and Chew: Driving and Parking at School

It has been a very hectic few weeks around Monty Middle for folks trying to drive, park and drop off your child during major neighbourhood road construction. Many of our access points are being detoured due to the road paving and water main replacement process all good things for the neighbourhood, which cause all of us to reach a little deeper for patience and understanding. Last week I stood out with the local road construction team to ensure that our students were following the directions being provided by the Flagging Safety Crew. Our kids were very good, conscious of safety hazards, respectfully making adjustments to their travel routes and patiently waiting for instructions to safely get into the school.

The same cannot be said for some of our parent drivers. I witnessed rude communications and vehicular disregard for safety when travelling around Glenholme/ Edgewood and Kugler entry and exit points. One construction crew member was shocked that the two of us received a rude gesture because of our request to go EXTRA slow around the barricades and loose gravel. The concern is that we want to ensure that students are safe, that you as a driver are safe and that your vehicle is safe as it maneuvers through some tight and precarious situations.

Speaking of unsafe situations, a review of surveys on student safety in North America had some interesting results that I think are worthy of sharing and then teasing out some insights and possible alternative perspectives that relate to traffic safety. According to a major American social media think-tank here are the top safety concerns of parents surveyed and the top incidents of death amongst children.

Top Five Parent Fears for their KIDS

- 1. Kidnapping
- 2. School Snipers
- 3. Terrorists
- 4. Dangerous Strangers
- 5. Drugs

- Top Five Reasons for Childhood Death
 - 1. Car Accidents
 - 2. Drowning
 - 3. Abuse physical, sexual
 - 4. Suicide
 - 5. Homicide

As one can see the fears are very different that the reality of childhood life in North America. Children are actually safer when they are out of their family car and are walking with friends to and from school as they will learn more about directionality in their community and establish a sense of relating to people and places in their local surroundings if they have to navigate the route on their journey to /from school. This travelling to school will also be safer once the City of Coquitlam dedicates resources for all neighbours to safely walk through their community by installing sidewalks on the local streets. Removing student pedestrians from traipsing the edge of the main roadways, dodging parked cars and instead; in the near future, having the safety and luxury of cruising the sidewalks down our side streets. This would be the goal of what and why we are currently putting up with this traffic challenge with the hope of safer access for all to our neighbourhood school. Please try to stay away from these areas of congestion and drop your child off a block or two away so that they can walk a short distance in this beautiful spring weather.

Culture Beat: Events and Activities.

Class Placement for September - Each year, teachers, school based team members and administration meet to create classes that will ensure the best possible learning environment for every child in the school. There are some foundational beliefs and under-standings with which this process begins.

Firstly, please be assured that at Monty Middle, teachers work collaboratively to provide an appropriate learning situation for every child. Secondly, as with all reflective professionals, the teachers at Monty Middle make changes in their approaches and strategies of teaching to accommodate the students they serve. Thirdly, a team

approach is applied to working with children. Your child works with a number of teachers who support each other and work together to meet the needs of your child.

The following are some of the factors considered during the class building process:

Classroom teacher and school based team recommendations

The overall make up of the class being created

 \Box Learning styles

Intellectual, emotional, social, and physical development

Behavioural issues

Need for student services such as learning assistance

Male / female balance

Pre-existing conflicts between children

Pre-existing supportive relationships between children

Although each factor is important, each is weighted differently depending upon the individual circumstances under discussion. Decisions will be made with the child in mind, and the more global view of the class composition and school organization. Teachers will review all available information regarding a child and his or her class placement.

The following are NOT factors considered during the class building process:

Parent preference for a specific teacher

If you would like to share some information about your child from the home perspective, please note the following procedure:

Please do not state which teacher you do or do not wish your child to be placed with next year. Teacher assignments change from year to year, and the teacher you request may not end up teaching your child's grade level. We do our best to place your child in an appropriate setting given the information outlined above.

Any communication regarding class placement for the next school year should be in put in writing and submitted to the principal, Rob McFaul before the end of the school day on Friday, May 30th. All information shared will be considered during the placement process.

Safeteen Presentations – This Friday our Gr. 8 students will participate in a full morning session presented by our guests from Safeteen. The Gr. 8 students will be divided up by gender and each of the two gender based groups of approximately 30 students each will work with a same gender facilitator dealing with violence prevention strategies and putting into real contextual examples the Safeteen Violence Prevention Program – Teen's Bill of Rights. The sessions are designed to be based on real type community events with empowering strategies that build confidence and understanding of each teen's personal and unique situation as we accept that we are all different. The phrase: "These are my rights and just as I respect the rights of others I claim my right to defend these rights." Please take the opportunity to discuss the day's activities with your child and review the handouts presented to them during their sessions.

District Track & Field Meet – Our athletes represented our school very well last Wednesday as our coaches spoke about their sense of respect for all, their cooperative spirit and their desire to try their best in their specific events. The weather cooperated with a fine day of sunshine allowing our athletes a great opportunity to explore their event free from weather conditions that can challenge them with wind and rain impeding their efforts. Congratulations to all of the athletes and to their coaches for the day: Ms. Carruthers, Ms. Smallwood, Mrs. Clarke and our coordinator Mrs. Davis. We also would like to thank our parent drivers who helped with the transportation challenges and to our parent volunteers who worked in the actual day's events.

Gr. 8 Leaving Ceremony Volunteers – The end of year is quickly approaching and the tradition at Monty is to celebrate our Gr. 8 students with an assembly in the afternoon joined by the whole school and then refreshment sharing after the event of appetizers and punch. Dear Parents,

Re: Before and After School Bussing of Students

As you may have heard, The Board of Education of School District #43 (Coquitlam) will be ending the busing of students to and from school effective at the end of the current school year. Transportation for special needs students will continue.

Board Trustees and District Management staff thank all parents, staff and community members for their involvement in the budget process for the 2014-2015 school year. The Board considered many options made available through public input in its efforts to reduce costs and minimize disruption within the classroom. The Board values all feedback and considered it carefully in reviewing budget recommendations and final decisions. The School District is committed to maintaining a sustainable organization which is built on our past successes.

Our ability to continue to support the before and after school transportation of students has been impacted by static provincial funding levels that have not maintained pace with inflation. This was not an easy decision but one that was necessary given our fiscal restraints and legal requirement under the School Act to develop and submit a balanced budget to the Ministry of Education.

The Board's decision to reduce these services to students was a very difficult decision to make. The Board made the decision to remove regular bus route services in order to minimize the disruption to services in the classroom. Parents whose children currently use School District bus transportation will be required to seek out alternate ways for their children to arrive to and arrive home from school. This may include; walking, biking, being driven, or taking public transportation. The communities that make up our School District enjoy public transportation services. We are in communication with and have alerted municipal and Translink staff to this change for next year.

The School District continues to have an exceptional education community. The Board would like to thank everyone who has worked so hard to make our District outstanding and sustainable for years to come.

MIDDLE: Classes are designed to give students more time in a subject area or to provide a chance to preview a subject area. For example, a Math Grade 6 class might include students who have completed Grade 6 and would benefit from extra time. The class might also include students who have completed Grade 5 and would like to get ready for Grade 6. These courses are available to all middle school students, including ELL(ESL) students. Note: Classes do NOT replace an entire grade.

PLEASE SEE the <u>Secondary Skill Building Programs</u> for courses in Tech Ed and others geared towards students entering Grade 8 and 9.

<u>***Band & Visual Arts 6,7, 8:</u> We will be offering a Beginning Band and an Advanced Band class at Scott Creek Middle. Students will benefit from instruction in both a band class (either beginning or advanced) AND a visual arts class.

NOTES:

1) Instrumental rentals will be available for a fee. A rental session will be held in the Scott Creek Band Room on Monday, July 8th from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

2) Instrument selections made during the Summer Learning Program may not be the same as those recommended by your child's teacher in the regular band program. Teachers make decisions re: instrument selection based on suitability, program needs and availability.

Instrument options: Trumpet, Trombone, Baritone Horn, French Horn, Tuba, Flute, Clarinet, Bass Clarinet, Oboe, Alto/Tenor Saxophones, Bassoon, and a limited number of percussion and bass guitar.


Violin, Cello and string bass may be available to some Advanced Band students - prior experience is required.

Advanced band students interested in learning a new instrument may be able to take part in the Beginning Band as well (doing so would not allow participation in the Visual Arts portion of the course).

<u>Science (Outdoor Focus) at Hillcrest Middle</u> - This class will give students both in-class and outdoor experiences related to science concepts covered at grade level. Students can expect to take part in hands-on activities and experiments in addition to regular classroom activities.
