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McFaul's Chat and Chew: Experiential Learning

Middle school focuses much energy on building experiential learning opportunities for all students. A key pillar of all middle schools is the Exploration program that allows students over their three "middle" years to do hands on learning in various areas of the curriculum. We at Monty have held true to the four Exploration classes of Art, General Music, Home Arts and Technical Arts over the past few years. Some middle schools have variations of these four key areas maybe with a Drama class or a Leadership class mixed in to add or to complete one of the class cycles.

Monty has some valuable resources in terms of the people and in regards to the facility. Let us look at the people who teach in the Exploration cycle, for as a team they bring a wealth of experience and a

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host of project type ideas to their classroom instruction. Mrs. Rains will have them cooking and sewing up an apron, Mr. Magistrale will have them building gumball machines or maybe launching rockets. Mr. De Vita has already started with the African drumming and will have some of our students creating digital music, and along with Mrs. Hutchinson who weaves her magic through various creative dimensions and material mediums. Our school has the label of being old; however, along with that comes the luxury of having an extensive host of technical equipment in the woodwork, metal work, design centers combined with our fabric and culinary learning centers. Add to the mix the CORE curriculum subjects that allow our students to explore with science equipment, access three computer labs for research and a group of teachers that work creatively and diligently to prepare lessons and activities that teach cooperative learning, project based learning and social emotional learning while doing math and writing. This is the wonder of Experiential Learning and the magic of how the art of teaching blends with the science of teaching to create opportunities that are challenging, engaging and variable to reach the needs of many and to push their individual learning boundaries. Many times we are precise with our educational concoctions of learning and other times we need to have students share their talents for showing learning in ways that stretch us to incorporate into our assessments and in a shared evaluation of their academic and social skills progress.

Welcome to middle school! This happens daily in multiple rooms when some kids are tired, while others are fragile and still others are chomping at the bit to move further and faster. While the staff, work on managing how far and how fast for each student, it is truly a choreographic dance of body, soul and mind or as I like to say, head, heart and guts.

Dear School Administrators and Educators,

Re: Appropriate Halloween Costumes:

Halloween is fast approaching and once again Children of the Street Society is raising awareness about inappropriate Halloween costumes which sexualize children and youth, and glamorize sexual exploitation, pimping, and gang lifestyles. Costumes geared towards children and youth have become increasingly sexualized. Costumes such as "prisoner of love," and "pimp and ho," create false perceptions of the perpetrators and victims of sexual exploitation and human trafficking.

Sexual exploitation of children and youth is a devastating form of human trafficking. The average age of entry into the sex trade in Canada is 12-14 years old. Sexual exploitation involves the exchange of a sexual act for **any** consideration such as drugs and alcohol, a place to stay, popularity, or acceptance. This is illegal and child abuse and it is not the youth's fault.

Young people are recruited into exploitive situations for a variety of reasons, from false promises, gifts, addiction, coercion or control. Recruitment happens everywhere, including school grounds, shopping malls, transit, and particularly online through social networking sites and chat rooms. Sexual exploitation also includes the issue of child sexual abuse images.

Due to the prevalence of online activity, image sharing and online facilitated sexual exploitation has significantly increased. In fact, Cybertip.ca recently issued a warning about sextortion: a crime where the perpetrator threatens to distribute images that the victim provided them unless more photos are sent or money is paid.

Victims of sexual exploitation face significant barriers and long term effects including homelessness, violence, mental illness, drug and/or alcohol addiction, sexually transmitted infections, HIV and AIDS, drug affected babies, post-traumatic stress syndrome from physical, emotional and sexual abuse, social stigma, barriers to future employment and premature death. Dressing up in costumes that glamorize sexual exploitation or sexualizes young people only creates social acceptability and desensitization of this disturbing issue.

Dressing up as a "pimp" or a "gangster" also glamorizes the perpetrators of sexual exploitation, further normalizing this issue in the public eye. Many young men are lured into a gang or pimping lifestyle through false promises of money, power, respect, a sense of family, and protection – promises which lead to violence, criminal activity, and the risk of death. Earning a profit off of the buying and selling of children and youth, is sexual exploitation, and is illegal.

As a society, we have the unique opportunity to recognize that these costumes are not socially responsible, and instead encourage youth to emulate positive role models through what costumes they choose to wear. This year, we are asking the community to be socially responsible by choosing Halloween costumes that do not glamorize either the perpetrators or the victims of child and youth sexual exploitation. We are also encouraging the community to avoid costumes that glamourize gang or pimping

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lifestyles. Instead, please encourage children and youth to choose appropriate costumes that represent their own individuality and creativity.

Children of the Street Society is a provincial non-profit organization dedicated to the prevention of sexual exploitation of children and youth since 1995. The Society's mission is to take a proactive approach through public awareness, education and early intervention strategies to prevent the sexual exploitation of children and youth while offering support to families..  You will be directed to an email message where you need to include the following information:

- 2. the number of cards you would like to receive and;
- 3. your child's name (teacher &/or division if you know it) so we can send the cards home with your child.

Or; if you prefer, you can contact the program coordinator by phone or email below, as well.

- **Remember to ask your neighbours, friends and relatives, if they too would like to help generate funds for our school, by having their own Smile Cards. Or; maybe you want to load a card and give it as a gift... *Christmas is coming!*
- 2. Once you receive your Smile Card, it can be loaded at ANY Thrifty Foods store, at the Customer Service counter or through a cashier using your debit card, credit card or cash. If you choose to load your card through a cashier, please note that it will be a separate transaction and MUST be done prior to ringing through your groceries.
- 3. Use your card to pay for your purchases at **ANY** Thrifty Foods store! Keep it safe it represents CASH and re-load it when it is empty! **ALWAYS ASK FOR YOUR CARD BACK.** Sometimes cashiers will assume you no longer need the card if it is empty. Only cards issued through our school (electronically attached to Montgomery Middle) will benefit our school.

If you should happen to lose your Smile Card once it is loaded, contact Thrifty Foods ASAP so that your lost card can be "frozen".
