## English 10 is comprised of 2 parts:

A. LITERARY STUDIES 10 - The study of literature from various eras and geographical regions. This is added to your schedule in October as it is NOT a separate class. You do not pick this class.

## B. One of:

COMPOSITION 10 - In this course, students will work on paragraph structure as well as a variety of essay-writing endeavours. Students will go through the processes of drafting, reflecting, and revising. For students who may need English support, particularly in writing, and who are considering post-secondary studies, this course is ideal.

CREATIVE WRITING 10 - Do you enjoy writing short stories, newspaper articles, poems, and engaging in all sorts of other creative expression through language? If so, this course is for you! This course would also benefit students who think about writing as a career, or who consider pursuing English Studies in a post-secondary setting.

FOCUSED LITERARY STUDIES \& COMPOSTION 10 HONOURS - Taking the goals and concepts from English 10 a step further, English 10 Honours is intended for self-motivated students who have demonstrated exceptional skills in speaking, listening, reading, and writing in the English language. As with English 10, we will explore and create written, oral and visual texts; help develop a lifelong love of reading, writing and learning; think critically and deeply about different world views; and gain awareness and appreciation of First People's contributions to Canada's heritage through study and use of First People's literature, and teaching and learning principles. This course, in addition to addressing the curricular components outlined in the English 10 course description, emphasizes developing students' skills in academic writing and requires students to read widely at a sophisticated level. Students will have the opportunity to develop background knowledge from the Western tradition in literature, which will be beneficial for senior level English Honours courses. In sum, an Honours student should have a strong, genuine passion for the subject and a willingness to receive feedback for the sake of pure learning and self-improvement.

NEW MEDIA 10 - New Media 10 provides skills relevant to digital literacy in our modern world. Digital literacy is an essential characteristic of the educated citizen and coursework is aimed at providing students with a set of skills vital for success in increasingly complex digital times. Emphasis is placed on understanding the changing role and impact of technology, and written work as well as other forms of communication will take place through a variety of digital and print media.
