Dear Porter Street Families.

It is hard to believe that we are well into our third and final term of this school year.

Our wonderful Grade 5 students have begun the exciting process of what we call, *Grade 5 Articulation to Middle School*. Our Grade 5 students will attend either, Como Lake Middle School, Maillard Middle School, Banting Middle School or Hillcrest Middle School depending on the catchment area they reside within and whether or not families have applied for cross-catchment access to another middle school.

The Principals and Vice-Principals from our neighboring Middle Schools have begun visiting our Grade 5 students to get to know them and talk about the many wonderful opportunities that await our students at Middle School.

In the next several weeks we will be welcoming each Middle School's Learning Services Team (made up of the middle school's Counselor, Learning Assistance Teacher and Resource Teacher). The Middle School Team meets with each of our Grade 5 Classroom Teachers and our Learning Services Team. Both teams review and articulate about each Porter Grade 5 student who will attending that Middle School.

In addition, each Middle School has scheduled Parent Information Evenings.

Already, this third term at Porter, our students trained for and participated in our District's Annual Como Lake Relays. All of our runners displayed outstanding effort! We are extremely proud of them!

Our Grade 3 to 5 students will, this week each afternoon, participate in *Track Attack*. Track Attack provides these students

with several opportunities to try and experience Track and Field events. Students can then decide if they wish to try-out fro our school Track and Field Team over the next several weeks as we prepare for the District Elementary Track and Field Meet at Percy Perry Stadium on Friday, May 27, 2016.

Many of our Grade 4 and 5 students will, also, be participating in our annual *Porter Hockey League* (PHL). This popular tournament will be, for the most part, scheduled before Track and Field practices begin and after our Track and Field Meet on Friday, May 27, 2016.

Our Porter School PAC (PSPAC) have a number of extracurricular programs on the go and are planning some wonderful events before the end of this school year.

Extracurricular programs currently on the go include: Theatrix, Lasermaster, Papier Mache Arts, MoreSports, Bricks-4-Kidz, Km Club, Popcorn Days, Hot Lunch Days, and PJ Movie Nights.

## Dogs on Porter School Property - a reminder for all of us

We recognize and appreciate that dogs are significant and adored members of some of our families, and caregivers take advantage of the morning and afternoon walk to school to exercise their dogs. We need to balance this with the acknowledgement that not all of our community members are comfortable with dogs. When dropping off and picking up your child, all dogs should be leashed and under the direct control of the owner. Dogs should never be off leash or tied unattended to fences or other objects. We also ask that owners be mindful not to enter the school with their dog and not to block the major entrances and exits to the school or be around the playfields/structures, as some of our students and parents are uncomfortable coming into contact with dogs.

Concerns have also been raised about dog owners not cleaning up after their pets. We are requesting that pet owners ensure that feces and residue is not left on school grounds, especially where children play, including the fields, wooded playground borders, and in many other areas of our school. While it is difficult for school staff to supervise school property usage during the evenings and weekends, the City of Coquitlam Bylaw Office has been contacted to help monitor school grounds during these times.

The staff at Porter Elementary School is working hard to ensure a safe and caring school environment and with your cooperation we hope to continue to work with all of our community members.





### **Parenting Wisely Course**





The Porter School Library, has for the last several years, sponsored a literacy event for grade 5's in our school called "Reading Link Challenge" promoted through the Poirier Public Library. This exciting project is designed to promote the fun of reading and develop partnerships between schools and local public libraries.

Here's how the program works. Interested students in grade 5 form teams of 6 and are responsible to read and become very knowledgeable with a set of six selected books. At the first challenge level, teams compete against each other within our school, answering questions in front of a quizmaster based on the 6 books. The winning team at each participating school will then go on to the next challenge level. This competition will take place at the public library sometime in March



during school hours. The competition is repeated with a different set of questions against teams from other local schools. At the final challenge level, a number of winning teams from various schools across the lower mainland come together for a Grand Championship competition at a community event with a public audience.

The books were released and distributed in November. The in-school challenge will take place sometime in March or early April. The winning team from our school will move forward to the city library challenge this Wed Apr 20 at Coquitlam City Centre Library—GOOD LUCK GIRLS! The next step is, *The Grand Challenge* which will be held sometime in late April, but only if we win at the local competition.

This wonderful opportunity encourages students to read a wide variety of literature, work as a team and discover that reading can be a pleasurable lifelong experience. In order to make this event successful, we need participating students to commit to read the 6 books (books are provided) and to attend practices that were held in the library on TUESDAYS during the lunch hour beginning in January.

# Irish Dancing comes to Porter!


Just before Spring Break our school was treated to a special performance by Irish Dancers, a number of members who are, also, Porter students!

# **REMINDER:**

# Parking, Traffic and Safety Issues

Back in mid-November 2015 I sent an email to our school community and staff. In it I shared that I had the opportunity to talk to several of our neighbours who had approached me very respectfully to share some thoughts and concerns about our parents and parking issues as well as safety issues for all. Most of these neighbours had, at one time, children attend our wonderful school.

Since then, our Km Club Parent Volunteer Coordinator, Roger Boon, and I have spoken about the these issues. In addition, we have each contacted our City By-Laws Department as well as our local RCMP.

### Student safety and following our City's Parking and Drop-Off and Pick-Up By-Laws MUST be respected.

Since Christmas Break we have had both City of Coquitlam By-Laws Enforcement Officers and RCMP Officers present and looking for people breaking the law. They have been absolutely shocked at the blatant disregard for student (and people) safety as well as for our Parking and Drop-Off and Pick-Up By-Laws. They have already issued a number of tickets.

They will continue to do so during the months of April, May and June! In fact, they are increasing their frequency of being at Porter during Drop-Off and Pick-Up times.

- please do not double or triple park; please do not park blocking any portion of any of our neighbours' driveways


### Before school and after school:

Parking Restrictions covered under the City of Coquitiam Street and Traffic Bylaw No. 4402, 2014. Certain parking restrictions are in effect whether or NOT signs are in place.

### NO PARKING:

- within 2m either side of a driveway:
- within 5m of a fire hydrant;
- within 6m of a crosswalk:
- Within 9m of intersecting roadway: within 6m of a stop sign or traffic signal;
- within an intersection;
- within 3m of an alley;
- in an alley or back lane in a position which leaves less than 3m of travelled road width or restricts the flow of traffic;
- In an alley or back lane 5.5m directly in front of a garage or driveway; or
- beside a median, traffic Island or traffic bulge (see photo);

### Please note:

- · Vehicles greater than 6.5m in length, or have a GVW greater than 4,500kg, must park in an industrial area
- Trailers cannot be parked on any street unless they are attached to a vehicle
- No vehicle may be parked on any street for longer than 48 hours without being move

It is not practical or desirable to install signs Indicating parking regulations in every case.





# **BUILDING STUDENT SUCCESS BC's Redesigned Curriculum**

### Introduction to BC's curriculum redesign

Today we live in a state of constant change. It is a technology-rich world, where communication is instant and information is immediately accessible. The way we interact with each other personally, socially, and at work has changed forever. Knowledge

is growing at exponential rates in many domains, creating new information and possibilities. This is the world our students are enter-

British Columbia's curriculum is being redesigned to respond to this demanding world our students are entering. To develop new models, the Ministry consulted with experts in the field. They suggested that to prepare students for the future, the curriculum must be learner-centred and flexible and maintain a focus on literacy and numeracy, while supporting deeper learning through concept-based and competency-driven approaches.

The redesign of curriculum maintains a focus on sound foundations of literacy and numeracy while supporting the development of citizens who are competent thinkers and communicators, and who are personally and socially competent in all areas of their lives. British Columbia's redesigned curriculum honours the ways in which students think, learn, and grow, and prepares them for a successful lifetime of learning where ongoing change is constant.

### Key features of redesigned curriculum

At the heart of British Columbia's redesigned curriculum are the Core Competencies, essential learning and literacy and numeracy foundations. All three features contribute to deeper learning.

### The Core Competencies

The Core Competencies are the intellectual, personal, and social skills that all students need to develop for success in life beyond school. BC has identified three Core Competencies – Communication, Thinking and Personal and Social Competency as essential for all learners.

Core Competencies underpin the curricular competencies in all areas of learning. They are directly related to the educated citizen and as such are what we value for all students in the system.

### **Essential learning**

The curriculum for each subject area includes the essential learning for students, which represent society's aspirations for BC's educated citizen. The redesigned curriculum develops around key content, concepts, skills and big ideas that foster the higher-order thinking demanded in today's world.

### Literacy and numeracy foundations

Literacy is the ability to understand, critically analyze, and create a variety of forms of communication, including oral, written, visual, digital, and multimedia, in order to accomplish one's goals.

Numeracy is the ability to understand and apply mathematical concepts, processes, and skills to solve problems in a variety of contexts.

Literacy and numeracy are fundamental to all learning. While they are commonly associated with language learning and mathematics, literacy and numeracy are applied in all areas of learning.

### **Curriculum model**

All areas of learning are based on a "Know-Do-Understand" model to support a learning.

Three elements, the Content (Know), Curricular Competencies (Do), and Big Ideas (Understand) all work together to support deeper learning.

British Columbia's curriculum design enables a personalized, flexible and innovative approach at all levels of the education system.

All areas of learning have been redesigned using this model.

### Content (Know)

The Content learning standards — the "Know" of the Know-Do-Understand model of learning — detail the essential topics and knowledge at each grade level.

### **Curricular Competencies (Do)**

The Curricular Competencies are the skills, strategies, and processes that students develop over time. They reflect the "Do" in the Know-Do-Understand model of learning. While Curricular Competencies are more subject-specific, they are connected to the Core Competencies.

### Big Ideas (Understand)

concept-based competency-driven approach to





The Big Ideas consist of generalizations and principles and the key concepts important in an area of learning. They reflect the "Understand" component of the Know-Do-Understand model of learning.

The big ideas represent what students will understand at the completion of the curriculum for their grade. They are intended to endure beyond a single grade and contribute to future understanding.

Any of the elements may include elaborations. Elaborations are provided where necessary to clarify some words or statements and may include examples, key questions, definitions or be used to describe breadth and depth for content. Elaborations are presented as "mouse-over" links on the website.

### Concept-based, competency-driven curriculum

British Columbia's redesigned curriculum brings together two features that most educators agree are essential for 21st-century learning: a concept-based approach to learning and a focus on the development of competencies, to foster deeper, more transferable learning. These approaches complement each other because of their common focus on active engagement of students. Deeper earning is better achieved through "doing" than through passive listening or reading. Similarly, both concept-based learning and the development of competencies engage students in authentic tasks that connect learning to the real world.

### Flexible learning environments

Learning can take place anywhere, not just in classrooms. Many schools and teachers create learning environments that explore the use of time and space in creative ways. The integration of areas of learning and technology also have opened the door for teachers and schools to approach the use of time and space in creative ways – ways that adapt to the students' needs and interests.

Although the learning standards are described within areas of learning, there is no requirement for teachers to organize classrooms, schools or instruction in this manner. In effect, the Ministry of Education defines the "what" to teach but not the "how" to organize the time, space or methods to teach it.

The focus on personalization and the flexible structure of the curriculum support the configuration of combined grade classrooms. Classes of students of more than one grade provide opportunities for teachers to develop a mindset that sees all the students as a group of learners with a range of needs and interests. Multi-grade programs should find a comfortable fit with the curriculum.
