B.C. MINISTRY OF EDUCATION ANNOUNCEMENT: RETURN TO IN-CLASS LEARNING ON JUNE 1st

The following was published in the ministry newsletter *Learn* on May 16th. We will update later this week with more specific school information:

The Provincial Health Officer has deemed it safe for B.C. K-12 schools to gradually expand in-class instruction, which will begin on June 1st. This decision is based on the most recent science and research available. Parents and guardians can choose to return their children to in-class instruction on a part-time basis as part of **B.C.'s Education Restart Plan**, with the goal of returning to full-time classes in September 2020.

Our top priority is student and staff safety; therefore, all Boards of Education and Independent School Authorities will be implementing strict health and safety measures that adhere to the standards set by the Provincial Health Officer and WorkSafeBC, as well as the <u>Provincial COVID-19 Health & Safety Guidelines for K-12 Settings</u>.

"School is the place where kids learn how to connect with others and grow together, and it's incredibly important for students who need extra support to get more time with their teachers and support workers", said Rob Fleming, Minister of Education. "We've looked at what measures other jurisdictions are putting in place across the world and we're taking direction from our provincial health officials, so students, educators and staff know we're taking every precaution to protect their health and safety."

Coquitlam Continuing Education

The school district will be opening registration soon for summertime Grade 10-12 high school credit courses. The following two options will be provided as Distributed Learning through Coquitlam Open Learning:

Coquitlam Open Learning Gr 10-12:

Grade 10-12 full credit courses

Free to eligible school-aged BC Residents aged 13 to 19 years old.

Registration available to students enrolled in SD43 schools only, starting this Friday May 8, 2020. Students are not eligible for courses they are currently taking in their current schools, (they can take those starting in July, including Fast Track)

Online courses with flexible start dates which should be completed within 10 months of registration. Students will participate in various online activities which may include Moodle online lessons, online discussions, and e-mail interactions with the teacher. Students can begin these courses within a few days after registering.

Fast Track Gr 10-12: Complete a full credit course from July 2 to August 3:

Fast Track courses follow a blended learning model:

- two weekly synchronous class sessions (Tues/Thurs or Wed/Fri, mornings or afternoons (see specific courses for scheduling). These class sessions will most likely be conducted online.
- three days of online work. Teachers will be available these days for online tutorial support.

Note: This program is best suited for students wishing to complete the selected course within a 6-week timeline.
