A Message from the Vice Principal, Laurie Ebenal

I am starting in my second year as the Vice Principal of Aboriginal Education. The department has undergone many changes but the goals of the Enhancement Agreement remain consistent and School District 43 has committed to engaging the community in working collectively to empower Aboriginal Children and Youth to achieve academic success, self reliance, and inner confidence. We are committed as a team to develop programs and services that add value or enhance current curriculum. Our journey as a school district community is to create an identity through defining what culture means to our students, families, Elders and staff. We are excited to engage our students in the experience of being Aboriginal as opposed to learning ‘about’ Indigenous People. We will focus on exposing all students to traditional Aboriginal customs and culture. This process is meant to create lifelong learners who have a passion, drive and desire to be academically successful and become productive members of a global society.

Each Aboriginal student was gifted an Aboriginal Education Student Planner. The planner is chalk full of descriptions of what services are being offered this year through our department. We have also included a description of new or changed services in the newsletter. I encourage reading your child’s planner and calling us if you have any questions.

Enhancement Agreement

The Aboriginal Education Program provides a wide array of resources and opportunities to enhance the learning environment for all Aboriginal learners—First Nations status, non-status, Inuit, and Metis.

Schools provide the daily structures and supports. Working with Aboriginal families, and the Aboriginal community at large, classroom teachers respond to the unique educational needs of their Aboriginal students. The responsibility for Aboriginal student success belongs to everyone and this is a common theme of the Enhancement Agreement.

The Aboriginal Education Enhancement Agreement focusses on the academic, emotional, physical, and cultural growth of all students and raises the profile of Aboriginal learners. It is a means to an end, and the end is improved outcomes for Aboriginal students. It signifies the collective responsibility of School District No. 43, and all Aboriginal communities served by the district, for the success of Aboriginal students. Although the Aboriginal Education Department has taken the lead in working with the community, while developing the Aboriginal Education Enhancement Agreement, the daily experiences in schools will make it a living document that truly changes the reality of Aboriginal learners. All students, Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal, will develop greater knowledge and respect for Aboriginal traditions, challenges, and potential. The Aboriginal Education Enhancement Agreement has been informed and directed by a respectful, reflective, and open process of inquiry and relationship building. All contributions from both Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal participants have been valued, in a process led by the Aboriginal heart and mind and enhanced by input from the extended learning community.

Aboriginal Education Enhancement Agreement Goals:

1. Increase knowledge and respect for Aboriginal culture and history for all students
2. Increase the number of Aboriginal students reporting feelings of safety and a sense of belonging
3. Improve Aboriginal students' achievement
4. Improve Aboriginal students' grade-to-grade transition rate and 6-year Dogwood Completion rate

Guided by the four goals of our Aboriginal Education Enhancement Agreement, the Aboriginal Education Program of School District No. 43 strives to:

1. Promote the cultural identity of our Aboriginal students
2. Create a positive learning environment that supports the Aboriginal students
3. Improve academic achievement of all Aboriginal students
4. Raise awareness of First Nations cultures within our school community
5. Work in cooperation with schools, community, and Aboriginal families

Positions within the Aboriginal Education Department

The following descriptions provide information on the roles of staff within the department:

Aboriginal Resource Teachers: We currently have 4 resource teachers who are involved in facilitating quality programs and services in the schools, while liaising with district and community resource people.

Aboriginal Support Workers: We currently have 6 support workers who provide opportunities for Aboriginal students to meet outside the classroom to work together on culturally-based educational activities through the pull-out program. In the classroom, they support teachers to address the Aboriginal content requirements in the BC curriculum and also offer in class support for students.

Aboriginal Youth Workers: We currently have 7 youth workers who assist schools, parents, and students in their efforts to develop positive relationships and effective communication methods. They provide individualized support for students as needed. Services are generally accessed through a referral from the student's school.

Aboriginal Education Advisory Committee

The intent of this committee is to represent the diversity of Aboriginal peoples residing in the district, as well as school district partners. The committee will include representatives from the Kwikwetlem First Nations, 3 Aboriginal Parents and Elders (representing Port Moody, Coquitlam, and Port Coquitlam), current and former Aboriginal student representatives, and one representative from each of the following groups: Aboriginal Parent Focus Group, Coquitlam Teachers' Association (CTA), Coquitlam Principals' and Vice Principals' Association (CPVPA), and District Parent Advisory Council (DPAC). The Enhancement Agreement has a unique focus and identity, while being respectful and mindful of other district directions and priorities. The Committee meets throughout the school year to review the Enhancement Agreement.

What's new this year?

Suwa'lkh

Suwa'lkh, meaning 'First Beginning' in Stó:lō, includes culturally relevant curriculum to support Aboriginal students within the district who are struggling to succeed. The program will include support from teachers, youth workers, support workers, community members, parents, and Elders. Inclusion of local knowledge, culture, and traditions will help students connect with their urban community. It is important to note the student still remains registered in his/her home school.

This program is based at Minnehada Middle School. Program staff include Brad Ross (Teacher), Carrie Clark (Youth Worker), Andrea Hotomanie (Support Worker), and Dawn Brown (Elder).

Homework Support for the School Year

There are three opportunities available for homework support that Aboriginal students within the district can access:

1. Gleneagle Secondary School—academic support for high school students in the areas of Math and Science on Tuesdays from 3:30—6:30pm. To register, contact Janice at COL 604-945-4211.
2. Minnehada Middle School—academic support for Grades 1-8 in all subject areas on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 3-5pm. This program will be run out of the Suwa'lkh facilities. To register, contact Jacquie Boons at Aboriginal Ed 604-945-7386.
3. Kwayhquitlum Reserve—academic support for all grades and subject areas on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 3:30-5:30pm. To register, contact Janice at COL 604-945-4211.
