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## SUMMER SCHOOL COURSES

Riverside students planning on registering for summer school must meet with their counsellor prior to registration to discuss their course plans. **If taking a summer school course involves a course change for next year, you must check to make sure there is room in the new course.** Counsellors will assist students in making course choices that meet their educational goals and plans. Once this process is complete, students may proceed with creating a new account or updating an old one with Summer Learning prior to registration.

Note: Both paper application and counsellor approval are required for International Summer School courses. On-line registration for Grade 9 and 10 remedial courses and ESL summer school courses will take place beginning at the end of May. Counsellors generally wait for final June marks before recommending remedial summer school courses or ESL courses. There is always room in the courses and ample time to register in late June. Contact the counsellor for further information.

## COMMENCEMENT COMMENTS

There are still a few grade 12 students who have not provided a comment to be read at Commencement. Students should meet with their counsellor asap to take care of this.

## SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS

Each year at Commencement, the scholarship and bursary awards won by your son or daughter are read out as he or she crosses the stage. If your child has won a scholarship or bursary please inform Ms. Chittenden as soon as possible so that appropriate recognition is made.

## STUDY TIPS

With only about 5 weeks of the semester left, students are gearing up to finish all of their courses successfully. 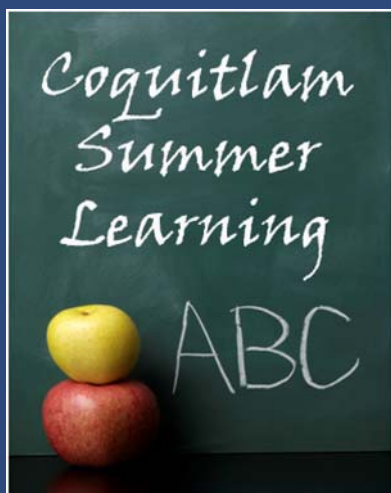

# HELP KEEP YOUR GRADUATES SAFE

It's an exciting time of year at high schools across the province. Graduation marks the culmination of years of hard work and a time for students to celebrate their accomplishments as they get ready to enter the next phase of their lives. As graduates are getting ready to plan parties and other celebrations, invitations and what they'll wear aren't the only things they need to consider. They must also plan ahead for a safe ride home. Although graduates know they're not of legal age to drink alcohol, the reality is some of them will. And while most grad parties go off without a hitch, some unfortunately have devastating consequences.

In B.C., car crashes are the number one preventable cause of death for youth. On average, three youth are killed and 1,160 injured in the Lower Mainland in April, May, and June every year. Year-round speed, impairment and driver inattentiveness are the top contributing factors in fatal crashes involving young people in B.C.\*

Few know the consequences of making poor choices like ICBC [road safety speaker](#), Kevin Brooks. Kevin lost his best friend one Saturday night while driving drunk in Surrey. From his wheelchair, Kevin shares his personal, heart-wrenching story with high school students each year to remind them of the importance of making smart driving decisions.

For the past 16 years, ICBC road safety speakers have been sharing their first-hand experiences with more than 50,000 B.C. high school students each year.

Parents can also help make sure their teens have a plan for a safe ride home before they head out for the evening.

Here are ICBC's tips to help parents with those conversations:

**Know their plan:** Does your teen have a designated driver planned for their entire evening? Many grads treat themselves to a limousine ride – make sure they plan a safe ride home if they'll be going to any other celebrations or if the limousine isn't scheduled to drive them home.

**Plan B:** Things don't always go as planned so talk to your teen about expecting the unexpected and what their alternative options are to get home safely. Review a few scenarios with them to help guide them on how they can make smart choices.

**Make it unconditional:** If you haven't already, consider letting your child know that they can call you at any time if they ever need a ride. If they do call you for assistance, be supportive and consider saving your questions for the next day or at least until you're home. If you can't pick them up yourself, you can always have them return home safely in a taxi.

**Power of choice:** Use real-life scenarios to talk to your teen about their driving behavior rather than lecturing them. If they're going to be a designated driver, talk to them about not letting passengers or peer pressure influence their choices and that a real designated driver is one who does not drink at all.

**Power of influence:** Your teen's choices can have a significant influence on their friends. For example, if they take a stand against impaired driving they can help create a culture that recognizes making smart decisions. Even if you're confident that your child is going to make the right choices, talk to them about looking out for their friends, especially those they know are easily influenced by others. And don't forget, you also set an example for them every day with your own driving behaviour.

# 2014 SPRING BREAK TOUR TO ITALY & GREECE

**If you've ever wanted to sample some of the flavors, experiences and warmth of Europe here's a Chance of a Lifetime!**

Next spring break, the opportunity exists for Riverside students to travel abroad to Europe and visit some of the most culturally significant, historical, economic and political landmarks in the world. This two week trip starts in Italy and the historic city of Rome. Site visitations to The Vatican Museum, the Sistine Chapel, St. Peter's Basilica, The Roman Forum, Piazza Navona, The Pantheon, The Trevi Fountain and the Spanish Steps are just some of the landmarks on the itinerary. Once through Rome, we're onto Pisa and the Leaning Tower, prior to our home stay in Florence. Students from our sister school in Florence, Italy will host and take us through some of the most breathtaking landscapes and topography in all of Tuscany. While in Florence, we will be hosted by students from Alessandro Volta, our sister school, in the historic district of Bagno di Ripoli. The opportunity to take in a first division soccer game featuring the Fiorentina, also exists. While in Tuscany, we will also visit the cities of San Gimignano, Vinci, the birthplace of Leonardo and Sienna. A day trip to Venice is planned where students can ride a gondola and experience some of the Muslim influence that once penetrated Europe.

Next we fly to Athens, Greece, hike to the Acropolis and visit Parliament House, the birthplace of democracy. The Olympic Stadium, site of the Ancient Olympic games is on the agenda as is a day cruise around the islands of Poros, Hydra and Aegina. The trip fee of \$4200 includes air fare, travel insurance, hotel fees, breakfast and dinner, museum and monument entrance fees, tips for guides, departure taxes, bus and guide fees, local service fees and transportation by privately chartered bus while travelling.

## SOCIAL MEDIA CORNER

New social media sites are emerging constantly and it is difficult for schools and parents to remain knowledgeable about how young people are using these tools. For this reason, through the district we will provide you with periodic updates on the latest sites. The purpose of these updates is to inform you of where your kids may be active so you have some basic information about the site and its potential issues. To that end, we are suggesting you become familiar with the following two sites:

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### Ask.fm

This is a website where user provides answers to questions submitted by others. Questions can be asked by users with or without existing accounts, meaning **users can ask questions anonymously**. Questions tend to be of a personal nature, such as “Action or comedy movies?” or “Thoughts on Sarah K?”. Answers can be “liked” by other users. Unfortunately, the anonymous nature of the site can encourage questions which are negative or sexual. As well, profiles are public and can sometimes be connected to a person’s Facebook or Twitter accounts and identify their location. Users can search by username, name, surname, e-mail or location. We are hearing of significant recent activity by students on this site, and the anonymous nature of posts is leading to significant negative and risky content. Because posts tend to be small, most of this activity is likely done from personal mobile devices, such as smartphones.

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### Snapchat

Snapchat is an application for smartphones and Apple iOS devices. Snapchat allows users to capture pictures and videos and send them as messages to other users. Every Snapchat message has a viewing time-limit ranging from 1 to 10 seconds, as selected by the sender. The timer starts when the recipient opens the message. When the time-limit is reached, the message is deleted and can no longer be viewed using Snapchat. Unfortunately, the short lifespan of these posts encourages students to engage in risky behavior under the belief that the content will quickly disappear. However, many receiving devices have screenshot capabilities, usually allowing a screen capture in about 1 second. The result of this is that an already ill-advised, risky post can become a permanent liability for a student. Snapchat does not review the content of messages, which allows posts of a sexual nature to be transferred between phones with no monitoring. Snapchat also has a HISCORE rating - a HISCORE is the total number of snaps sent and received between a sender and their contacts, encouraging increased use through competitive behavior.

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We will all need to work together to make sense of how to best educate our students for this digital world which increasingly defines their social context. As part of this work, we will endeavor to share information about the latest sites and trends so as to increase your awareness and ability to respond. Please let us know if there is any specific information we can provide which you believe would help you understand these tools better. For now, we will provide these periodic updates as we become aware.

## RIVERSIDE AWARDS CEREMONY 2013

Riverside Secondary Awards Ceremony will be held on **Tuesday June 25<sup>th</sup> 2013**. We look forward to an evening that celebrates the academic successes of our top students. This year after a review process which included consultation with staff, students, and our P.A.C., the awards ceremony will take on a different look than it did in the 2010/2011 school year. In the past, Honour Roll, Service Awards, and Subject Excellence awards were distributed in the awards ceremony. One of the challenges has always been that we have experienced less than 60% attendance in these categories, a trend that has been increasing over time. As a result we have reshaped the distribution of the awards, still honouring those achievements but recognizing them through presentation of certificates in classes or through departments.

The Awards evening will be moved into the cafeteria and take on a more intimate format in which we will recognize the top awards winners for each grade, the top grade 12 subject awards and combine it with a celebration of our scholarship winners. We also intend on recognizing the top award winners from each grade level in our opening assembly of the 2013/2014 school year. Invitations will be sent out electronically as well as by an automated phone call. Further details will be released as we get closer to the event.

# HEADS UP!

Riverside teachers are committed to making Riverside a caring and compassionate school community. To this end, we formed a mental health focus group with two specific goals: one, to share resources on mental health awareness with parents and students and the other, to organize a Professional Development day focused on Mental Health Awareness.

Throughout this year, this *Heads Up!* feature has appeared in the monthly newsletter with tips on positive mental health and links to sites with information on stress, depression, anxiety, the teenage brain, and eating disorders. A *Heads Up!* poster has also been created providing easy access to [a new district page](#) which brings together these mental health resources. A major concern is that students who 'Google' mental health information often come across sites that can do more harm than good. Teachers and parents are encouraged to refer students to this page for reliable sources of information and support, including crisis line information.

Our May 17<sup>th</sup> Pro-D day will focus on Mental Health Awareness: several students who made moving presentations at the school's Spoken Word festival will share their creative writing about struggles with body image, depression and anxiety. Teachers will learn more about mental health and discuss how we can make our classrooms more supportive to students. Guest speakers from the Mood Disorders Association will share their personal stories, counselors will review ways to support students, and a district psychologist will lead a workshop on mindfulness.

The well-being of our students is just as important to us as their academic achievement. Riverside is committed to being a caring, compassionate and connected school community.
