Intellectual Development

Goal:

Numeracy

Rationale:

We have approximately 30% of our student population who need support with basic computational skills. We also have a large number of students who are extending in numeracy. We want to lessen the gap.

Planned Actions:


- -Collection Task School-Wide Assessment (Fall and Spring)
- -Baseline assessments
- -Culture of Numeracy: Buddy Math, Drop Everything and Compute, K-5 Math Games, Family Math, Lunch Sharing (Teacher PD)
 Math Facts Focus to build foundational skills for complex problem-solving. Building this in to student services
- -Daily math routines to build basic computational skills -Making a common school-wide schedule to support Numeracy Routines
- -Create a math game binder

Indicators of Success:

- -Increased visibility of numeracy structures and activities in the school
- School-Wide participation in Collection Task twice per year and as needed for specific students; use outcomes to inform instruction
- Increased dialogue and collaboration regarding numeracy instruction among staff (regular Staff Meeting discussions, designation of time at PD)
- Increased use of Math games to reinforce basic Math facts
- -Collaboration time for teachers to discuss numeracy routines
- -Data tracking: are we making a difference

School Community Engagement Process:

- -Communication with families via weekly and monthly teacher and school newsletters/communications
- Highlighting school events to celebrate numeracy
- Lunch Club for numeracy games (Uno, Chess, Card Games, etc.)
- More effective use of Library Learning Commons to support/augment STEAM initiatives

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Human and Social Development

Area of focus:

We have spent this past year building our Culture of Taking Care and enhancing student leadership opportunities as a foundation for building a strong school community.

Planned Actions:

- -Continue to incorporate common language to promote school values (Take care of yourself, others, this place), WITS, Small Problem Solvers
- Continue Team Time format as a student-led initiative; Continue Heron on the Lookout
- Continue having the courtyard for quiet games, supported by grade 5 students -Create opportunities for intermediate students to help younger students learn about the native plants that abound RVP
- -Incorporate school-wide culture building activities into our schedule; for example, Reading Leaders

Indicators of Success:

- -Students using common language of WITS
- Students recognizing and using strategies for solving conflicts, keeping problems small
- -Culture of Taking Care: students learning from older students how to take care of our RVP community by taking care of each other, ourselves, and this place: specifically the native plants that abound our RVP grounds.
- -Grade 5 Herons using restorative practice script to help younger students during recess and lunch

- -Student leadership role

- -Introduction of new activities to students outlining clear expectations

Planned Actions:

Continue to build on and establish traditions for our National Day for Truth and Reconciliation and Indigenous Peoples Day

- -Continue the Welcome Wall
- -Learning more about native plants local to RVP

Indicators of Success:
