Our staff will host an information session on Friday, February 27th, 8:50-9:15am in the gymnasium. This is a great opportunity for parents to see the format.

We will also present them at our next PAC meeting on February 23rd at 6:45pm.

CODE RED LOCKDOWN DRILL



Walton Elementary will practice a Code Red Lockdown Drill in April. The exact date is yet to be determined.

In 2007, I had to initiate a Code Red Lockdown at Vanier Elementary. We had a suspicious male enter the school and proceed to the girls' change room. He acted in a very erratic manner when staff approached him. Sensing that the individual may be unsafe, we initiated a Code Red Lockdown. Teachers locked all the doors and moved their students away from doors and windows. We called 911 immediately and reported an intruder in our building. Within minutes, the RCMP responded and swept the building. This process took an hour but the individual had left the building. We was spotted near another elementary school later that day. No child at Vanier was harmed.

What is a Code Red Lock-down?

A Code Red Lockdown is a response by students and staff to a potentially dangerous situation at, or near our school. This could involve an intruder in the school; a person acting in a violent or aggressive manner in the school or near school grounds; or a police incident in the neighbourhood.

All exterior and interior doors are locked. No one is allowed in or out of the building, including parents. Children are moved away from doors and windows and, if necessary,

duck and cover under a desk or table.

A Code Red Lockdown may be a scary event for the children. We do need to practice in the event the safety and security of the school is threatened.

During a Code Red Lock-down:

- 1. 911 will be called
- All exterior doors are locked. No one, except emergency responders will be permitted in the building. Parents will not be permitted into the building.
- All classroom doors will be locked. Window blinds will also be lowered.
- School staff will check the washrooms and escort any child back to their classroom, or to the nearest classroom.
- Children will be moved away from doors and windows.
- Depending on the situation, the school may or may not be able to communicate to parents during the lockdown.
 We may be asked by RCMP to be under a "blackout".
- Do not call the school.
 We need to keep our
 phone lines open to communicate with the police
 or other emergency services.
- Ending a Code Red will be given by the Principal, Vice-Principal or RCMP.

MANDARIN BILINGUAL UPDATE

Last month, we engaged the community with a survey asking parents to list the Top 3 Questions they had about the Mandarin Bilingual Program.

We had 37 parents respond to the survey.

Ms. Suen, Mrs. Denton and Mr. Mah analyzed the questions and found five common themes. These are ranked in order of number of responses.

- 1. Curriculum and Assessment
- 2. Registration of Native/ Non-Native Speaking students
- 3. Middle School and High School
- 4. School Support
- 5. Home Support

We are now working on a Frequently Asked Question section of our Mandarin Bilingual Program Document to provide answers to these five broad themes.




