ACCESS BC MICRO TRADES EXPERIENCE - MAY 2022

The Coquitlam School District will be running a 6-day micro-experience for Indigenous students , grades 9-12, who are interested in trying trades! This opportunity is an introductory experience , where students will get to learn in a supportive and risk free environment. No prior experience in trades or tech classes are required.

Students will be introduced to Carpentry, CNC machining, Landscaping and Cooking. They will also get lunch and or breakfast at each session, a tour of BCIT and over \$250 worth of personal protective gear and equipment that they get to keep upon completion of the program.


CAMERON BALLARD Heritage Woods 2020 Graduate Level 1 Electrician Apprentice

Did you know that the average starting salary for a level 1 Electrician is \$43,000

Cameron is a 2020 Heritage Woods Graduate. He took the SD43 Electricians Program in his grade 12 year and was able to graduate with is Level 1 as a certified Electrician. Before going into the program, Cameron was nervous that his dyslexia would prevent him from achieving his goal of becoming an Electrician. Cameron was encouraged by his teachers, counselors and family to try his best and give the program a try. To his surprise, Cameron excelled in the Electricians Program and he was able to earn top grades in the class. His work ethic, along with the the support of his amazing teachers allowed Cameron to achieve a goal he once that was unattainable. Cameron is an advocate for diversity in trades and believe that "anyone can do the trade if they are willing to work hard and have the support". This trade has changed my life. I encourage all student who are interested in trades to go for it!"

INDIGENOUS STUDENTS rades Experience

The Coquitlam School District will be hosting a micro-experience for Indigenous students interested in trying trades. This experience will take place over 6-days at Port Moody, Centennial and Riverside Secondary. Exact dates and times TBD. Students do not require any trades experience, but MUST apply. Spots are limited.

Students will be introduced to tool Safety, Carpentry, CNC machining, Landscaping and Culinary Arts. As a part of this program students will get to design and build cedar garden boxes that will be used to grow native herbs, vegetables and medicinal plants. Students will get the opportunity to learn about cultural practice and traditions from elders. Moreover, students will get to learn how to prepare a traditional meal, using the produce that they planted. This is an amazing opportunity for students to try a variety of trades in a supportive, risk-free environment.




WHY SHOULD YOU REGISTER FOR THE WORK IN TRADES PROGRAMS?

- For every 120 hours that students work in an apprenticeable trade with a certified tradesperson, they can:
- gain high school credits
- learn and apply specific skills while getting paid
- earn hours towards trade certification
- qualify for a \$1000 award from the Ministry of Education.
