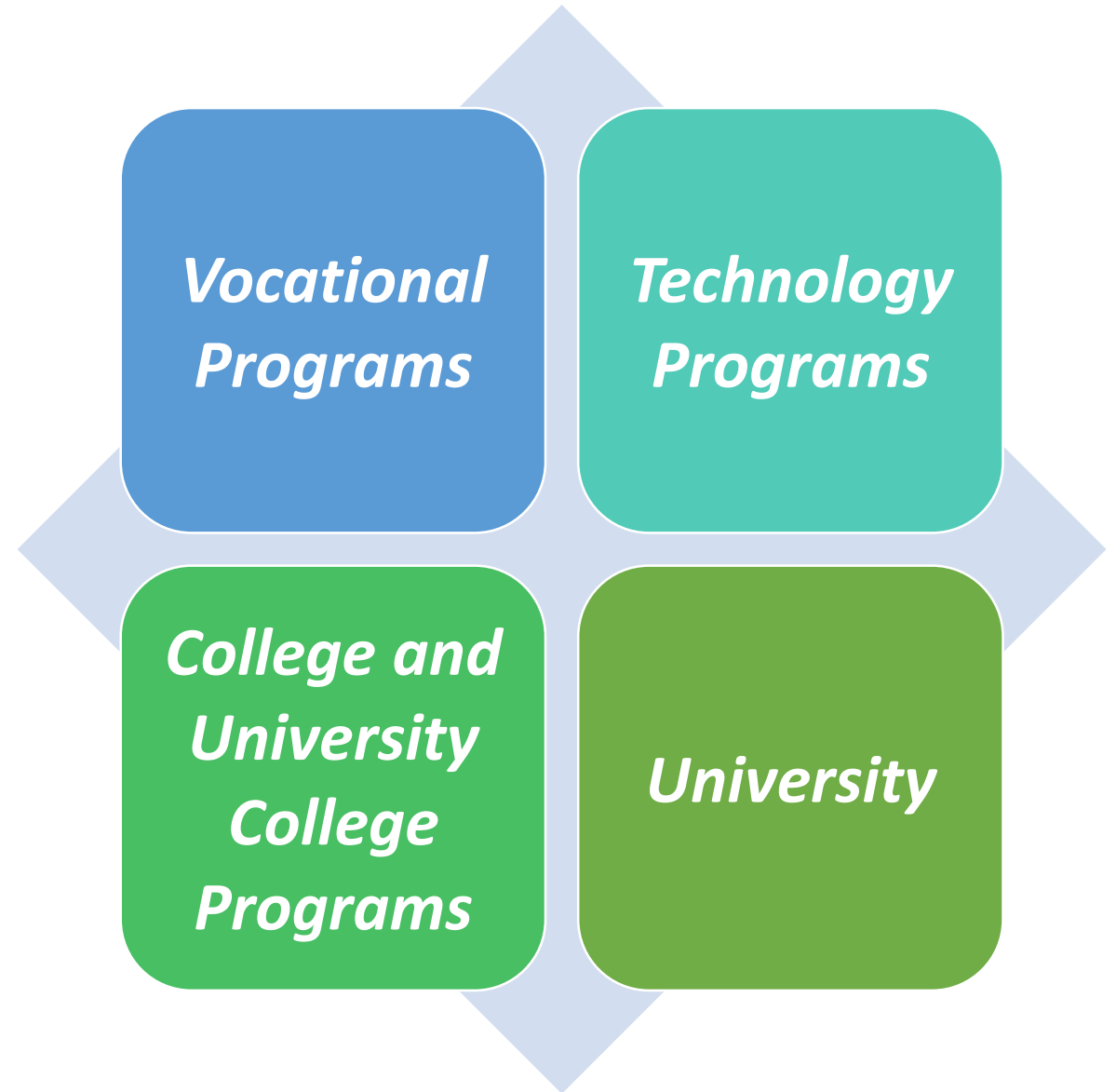

Minimum of 5 SFU Approved Grade 12 courses.

Minimum final grade of 70% in an English 11 or English Studies 12

Personal Profile to complete. Some programs will also require a Supplemental Application.

ALL the grade 11 and 12 courses the student has completed are considered to make a holistic admissions decision except for ADST, Career Education and Physical Education

Minimum of 6 Grade 12 courses (Not all off Approved List)

Minimum Language 11

Delta Challenge Exams

UBC meets language requirement only. These are second language exams worth course credits.

SFU and UVIC can be included in GPA calculation and fulfill the language requirement.

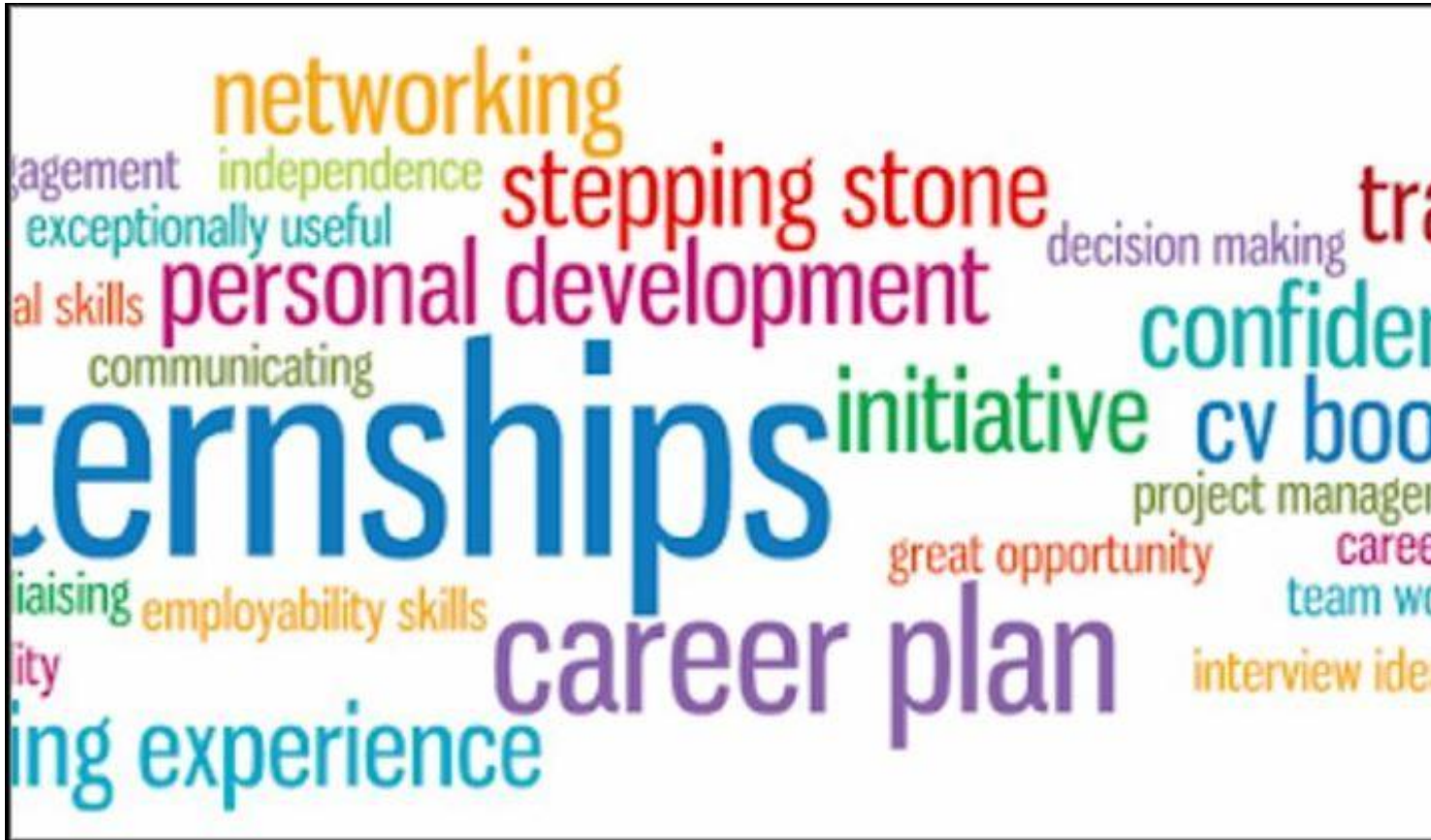

Secondary School Apprenticeship (Work in Trades)

Designed for high school students who have, or are seeking, full or part time paid employment in one of the 100+ apprenticeable trades (see ITABC.ca)

Earn up to 16 credits (4 courses) towards graduation for employment. 120 hours = 4 credits

Work hours count towards the completion of Level One training (1,500 hours)

Qualify for a \$1000 scholarship if you continue to work in the field 6 months after graduation or you amass 900 hours

If you decide to pursue that career later, those hours count towards certification
