Denis and Allan will arrive in Canada on Oct $28^{\text {th }}$ along with two other students, Steven and Moses who will be attending school in the Langley School District. The four students will have travelled for almost two full days to get here, travelling on a plane for the first time in their lives. They will leave right after the school closes for the semester to drive to the Nairobi airport, which takes about 4 hours. After some time in the airport they will take off, for what will surely be an exhilarating 9 hour flight to London. Heathrow will also be quite a sensory overload for the students with all its shops, trains and security checks. After about an 8 hour layover in London, they will board the final leg of their journey to Canada; a direct flight to Vancouver, where they will be greeted by members of the PA-MOJA team. The students will be brought to Charles Best that evening to get clothing, suitcases and the many other items donated by the members of the school community. We would like to thank all the people who brought items to the school for the boys to help them have a comfortable stay. The students have earned their trip to Canada by working hard on the Butterfly Effect course in Kenya (butterflyeffect.hoop.la). One of the main goals of the visit will be to work with the students in this course at Charles Best. Each student in the course has a project of their own personal interest which they research and then post online. They then give and receive comments from other students to improve their research. By having some intense time on the course in Canada, Allan and Denis will not only be able to improve their own projects, but also be able to return to Kenya to support the other students in the course. The first week in Canada will be busy with Halloween being their first day at Charles Best. Kenyans don't celebrate Halloween so it should be a fun experience for them to see all the students dressed up. The next day they will attend a conference for all Butterfly Effect students from Langley, Surrey and Coquitlam and Wednesday they will be attending 'Take Your Kids to Work' and going to the law courts. Generally, Allan and Denis will be at Charles Best on Mondays and Fridays each week and they will visit other PA-MOJA (PA-MOJA.com) sister schools (Maple Creek Middle, Kilmer elementary and Mary Hill elementary) on the other days of the week. We are excited to have Allan and Denis be a part of the school community and hope that many students will be able to interact with them during their stay in Canada. Allan, Denis and the Butterfly Effect students will be making and selling chapattis throughout the day on Nov. 18 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ as a fundraiser to support PA-MOJA's bursary student program. We hope that students will bring $\$ 2$ to buy a chapatti, meet Allan and Denis and help put a Kenyan student through school.

## 9th Annual Holocaust Symposium

The $9^{\text {th }}$ Annual Holocaust Symposium, run by the Social Justice 12 class, is scheduled for Wednesday, November $\mathbf{2}^{\text {nd }}$ from 9:00 am to $12: 15 \mathrm{pm}$. Over 600 students come every year from all the Tri-City Secondary Schools. We are privileged given that our students are the last generation to hear a survivor's story first hand.

## WE Day

We Day, on November $\mathbf{3}^{\text {rd }}$, is a powerful, life-changing event that combines the energy of a live concert with the inspiration of extraordinary stories of leadership and change. We have 27 students/staff attending. It brings together world-renowned speakers and award-winning performers with tens of thousands of young people to celebrate their contributions and kick-start another year of change. We Day has evolved from a single event nearly eight years ago into a series of 14 stadium-sized events held across Canada, the United States, and the UK. This past year, 200,000 students attended We Day and left inspired to create change at local and global levels. You can't buy a ticket to We Day. Students earn their event tickets by taking one local and one
global action through We Schools, our yearlong educational program that engages and empowers young people to become compassionate leaders and active citizens. Some students collect food for homeless shelters. Others raise money to build classrooms overseas. Thankfully, we have a strong leadership core of students every year. Interestingly, over the last 7 years, we have also housed over 600 students from Kelowna school district and prepared their breakfast and lunches for the event-and we will continue that tradition this year as well. It is a wonderful opportunity for the BEST We Team to serve, supported by the administration, CUPE, and staff.

## Metfest

The Best Players are currently rehearsing no fewer than six one act plays. This year's fall one act play festival, Tragically Funny, will feature, Fitch and Cabbage, The Gentlemen of the Road by Baz Barrett, David Beecroft and Justin Sage-Passant as our zone festival entry. Additionally, Acting 12 will offer, Present Tense and Personal Effects, by John McNamara; as well as, All in Disguise, by Gene Taylor, and James Michael Elrod and The 15 Minute Hamlet by Tom Stoppard; and finally, The Actors Nightmare by Christopher Durang. Our fall one act festival runs November 22, 23, 24, 25 and 26, that's Tuesday to Saturday. A different mix of plays will be presented daily. Tickets are $\$ 8.00$ for students and seniors and $\$ 10.00$ for adults. Empowering students through public performance requires that they completely buy into a powerful positive collaborative process. This is intimidating yet compelling because this class asks students to be "all in" vulnerable, and at the same time, totally respectful both while rehearsing and while performing. Quality performances can only be achieved when students work together on their common objectives, work to find the truth of their collective stories. The legacy they create for the others who follow is inspiring. Performance arts build personal confidence, collaborative skills, social intelligence and strong connections with the community. Please continue to support the wonderful work we all do at the school and save the dates in your calendars to see these fantastic one act plays. See you all in November.

## Exam Week/Semester Turnaround

With the significant changes to the number of Provincial exams being offered, the end of semester one routine at the secondary schools will look different. The students will spend more time in session than in the past and the final few classes will be "double blocked" to create flexibility for students to demonstrate their learning and complete assessment. Grade nine, ten and eleven students will not be in session on the morning of Tuesday, January $24^{\text {th }}$ when the grade $12^{\prime}$ s are either writing their English 12 Exam or completing their GT interviews. On Friday, January $27^{\text {th }}$ Charles Best students will not have any regularly scheduled classes or exams. ## INFORMATION AND REMINDERS

## Youth Worker News

Starting this week and until the end of November, we are collecting items for animals. Items such as food (wet and dry) for cats and dogs, treats, toys, bird seed, hamster/gerbil/bunny food, dishes cages, collars/leashes will be accepted. Please help out an animal in need. We are also collecting blankets, warm coats for adults and kids, socks and mitts. All donations should be brought to the youth worker's room downstairs across from the Foods office.

## Parent EForms

We will be sending out a reminder (by email) to those parents who have not yet returned forms (Verification, Emergency Release, School Policy, etc).

## Medical Alert/Medication

If your child suffers from a medical condition that the school must be aware of, particularly in the event of an emergency, please complete the "Medical Alert Form". Students at this age are usually responsible for their medication through parent supervision. If you want school personnel to administer medication to your child you must complete the "Request for Administration of Medication" form. Please note, this form must be signed by your doctor. These forms can be found on our public website under Quick Links $\rightarrow$ Parent E-Forms.

## Allergies

For students who have a severe life threatening allergy that may require administration of epinephrine at school in the event of a severe allergic reaction, please ensure that you have notified the school and that you have completed an Anaphylaxis Emergency Action Plan. This form can be accessed on our school website under Parent eForms. This plan gives permission to school staff to administer epinephrine and includes important details regarding your son or daughter's care at school. If you have already completed the form and have provided the school with an epipen for emergency use, please check with the office staff to ensure that the pen has not expired.

## Type 1 Diabetes

In consultation with parents, education staff and health professions, the Ministries of Children and Family Development, Health and Education have developed new provincial standards for supporting students with Type 1 Diabetes in the school setting. The intent behind these new standards is to help create a safe and supportive environment for students with T1D in schools. As part of these new standards, the Ministry has developed a Diabetes Support Plan and Medical Alert Information Form that must be completed for all students with T1D at Dr. Charles Best Secondary School. Students also have the option of requesting Emergency

Glucagon Administration in the event of severe low blood glucose. These forms can be accessed on our school website under Parent eForms.

## Closure of Schools for Extreme Weather Conditions

In the case of extreme weather conditions such as ice, wind and/or excessive snowfall, the Superintendent of Schools has authority on behalf of the Board, to temporarily close a school. As a general expectation, parents should assume that schools are open. If parents believe the local conditions are unsafe, they should keep their child at home or arrange his/her early dismissal. If schools are to be closed before morning classes begin, an announcement will be made on local radio stations CKNW (980), CKWX (1130) and CBC (690) by 7:30 am if possible, and it will be posted on the district website (be sure to hit refresh to get the latest notices).

## FRENCH IMMERSION

Après deux baccalauréats, une maîtrise et une année de doctorat, je me retrouve encore une fois dans les couloirs où ma prédilection pour la langue française avait commencé. Cette fois-ci un petit changement de rôle : mes anciens professeurs sont désormais devenus mes collègues. Bien que ce soit encore un peu bizarre de fréquenter les zones de l'école qui autrefois m'étaient interdites, je commence à m'adapter lentement. Mais qu'est-ce qui m'a poussé à quitter mes études doctorales en littérature française pour ensuite poursuivre une carrière dans l'enseignement ? La réponse est simple : une passion pour l'enseignement du français. Je me demandais toutefois comment j'allais transmettre cette même passion à mes élèves de la $12^{\mathrm{e}}$ année tout en suscitant chez eux un intérêt pour le français au-delà du contexte scolaire. Comment allais-je leur faire apprécier leur dernier cours de français au secondaire ? Après deux mois d'enseignement, j'ai appris qu'il a fallu trouver un équilibre entre ma vision parfois ambitieuse en tant que jeune enseignant et le besoin collectif de mes élèves. Je reste exigeant tout en étant conscient que mon enseignement n'est pas fait pour moi ; il est pour et au service de mes élèves. Dans le contexte de l'immersion française, ce constat est d'autant plus pertinent que
notre but collectif est de pousser nos élèves à transposer leur français dans des contextes divers pour qu'ils en apprécient la valeur au-delà de la salle de classe. Jusqu'à date, j’ai des élèves qui veulent poursuivre des études en français à l'université, des élèves qui écoutent la musique du chanteur francophone Black M. et d'autres qui sont fiers de pouvoir utiliser l'adverbe certes dans une composition. Malgré les défis quotidiens, ce sont dans ces moments apparemment anodins que les mérites du programme d'immersion française atteignent leur paroxysme. Je ne peux qu'espérer que derrière mes exigences, mes élèves comprennent à quel point je tiens à cœur leurs intérêts, à quel point mon enseignement tient compte de leur avenir et de leurs besoins à la fois personnels et pédagogiques au-delà du secondaire, en étant conscient de cette durée éphémère, mais fondamentale de leur vie.
