## WHAT'S COMING UP?

## NOVEMBER 1: TAKE OUR KIDS TO WORK (GRADE 9)

This is a Canada wide program where parents, relatives, friends or volunteers take students to work. The program was started in 1994 to provide students the opportunity to see and experience real workplaces and professions. There is an assignment that students need to complete which has been given to them today. This assignment is due back to their block 2 teacher on November 2.

## NOVEMBER 1: HOLOCAUST SYMPOSIUM

This is the $10^{\text {th }}$ annual Holocaust Symposium and is a milestone given the age of the survivors. This year we have Janos Benisz who was born in Eszthergom, Hungary in 1938. At the age of 6, Janos and his mother were sent to Strasshauf concentration camp in Austria. Janos spent 9 months in Strasshauf until the Russians liberated the camp. He and his mother returned to the family home and shortly after Janos was placed in an orphanage in Budapest. At the age of 10, he arrived in Winnipeg as a war orphan. We have two additional speakers: Charles Best teacher Ms. Megan Leslie will survey other genocides of the $20^{\text {th }}$ Century and discuss our district's connection to Auschwitz. Six years ago, the Humanities department organized a Spring Break European tour to Holocaust sites - primarily Auschwitz. One student had a connection because his great uncle had been sent there. The keynote speaker is Lauren Faulkner Rossi, Assistant Professor of History at Simon Fraser University. She has taught modern German history and Holocaust and Genocide Studies courses in the United States and Canada. She has been involved with the Holocaust Educational Foundation for more than a decade and is currently working on articles about the cultural causes of genocide and the Holocaust, war, and gender. The Charles Best Choir, led by Mr. Brent Hughes will perform songs in Hebrew.

## NOVEMBER 9: REMEMBRANCE DAY ASSEMBLY - DR. CHARLES BEST SECONDARY REMEMBERS

On Thursday, Nov. 10, Dr. Charles Best is honoured to have local veterans speak about their experiences in the military and their service to Canada. Among the vets are Bob Sutherland, who just this past June was awarded the Sovereignty Medal for all of his volunteer work dedicated to helping vets with their lives after service. The other decorated Veterans include Doc Cumber, Russ Hellard, Norm Bonin, Peter Howard, James Leslie, and Corporal David Ward. This week, the Social Studies department will be putting up an Honour Wall in the display case outside the main office to feature our visiting Veterans. Together, with our local Veterans, we remember the thousands of men and women who lost their lives in war and various Peacekeeping missions.

## NOVEMBER 21 25: METFEST - DRAMA DEPARTMENT - THE BEST PLAYERS

This year the Best Players Fall One Act Festival, Till Wealth Do Us Part, will feature A Government Inspector by Nicoli Gogol, The Bear and A Marriage Proposal by Anton Chekov and a selection of Chekov short stories, The Drowned Woman and Too Late for Happiness, translated into small one acts by Neil Simon. ## MINISTRY OF EDUCATION - GRADE 10 TO 12 CURRICULUM

This week the Ministry of Education announced a delay in the full implementation of the Grade 10 to 12 curriculum. The implementation is still on track but the Ministry has opted for a more gradual approach.
What follows are the most recent timeline revisions according to the Ministry:

- The full implementation of Grade 10 continues as planned for all subject areas. The Grade 10 curriculum documents will be finalized and available for use by April of 2018.
- Grade 11 and 12 courses will have one additional year of transition support prior to the full implementation in July of 2019. The Grade 11 and 12 curriculum will be finalized and available at the end of June, 2018.
- The provincial graduation numeracy assessment will be implemented for the first time in January of 2018 with subsequent sessions in June and August of 2018.
- The provincial graduation literacy assessment will be implemented for the first time in January of 2020.
