Secondary Academic Completion (formerly known as "Remedial")

Courses: Grades 9 & 10 English, Math, Science & Social

These courses provide a path for students who achieved 40-49% in a course (during this 2020-2021 school year) to attain a passing grade. Students will be able to upgrade their mark to 50% (C-).

These courses will follow a hybrid format: Students will attend in-person for a Face-to-Face class once a week (either Thursday or Friday; you will be notified before the course starts as to which day you are to attend) and will attend online scheduled classes the other days.

Registration for Remedial courses is by referral only, see website or your high school counsellor for details. Referrals will be accepted until June 25. The referral form will collect some brief information from your teacher so we can customize your course to what you need to complete.



Inuit Elder, educator and historian, Louie Kamookak is best known for his extensive research into the lost Franklin expedition that led to the discovery of the HMS Erebus shipwreck in 2014.

The Royal Canadian Geographical Society made Kamookak an honorary vice-president in 2016. He also received a Governor-General's Polar Medal, the Inuit Heritage Trust Recognition award and in 2017 he was invested as a member of the Order of Nunavut and the Order of Canada.

YMCA Summer Work Student Exchange (SWSE) is a government-funded, national program offers opportunities for youth (aged 16 and 17) to improve their second official language skills, explore another part of Canada, and gain valuable work experience through a 4-week exchange to Québec during the summer.

- When taking part in the SWSE program, students live with a host family in Québec and are paid the provincial minimum wage to work full-time at a non-profit organization or public sector job such as a summer camp, childcare centre, community museum, etc. During weekends, students participate in a variety of group activities that allow them to get to know the culture, arts, history, and recreation opportunities of their new community. SWSE is funded by the Department of Canadian Heritage and is offered at minimal cost (\$125) to participants; this includes transportation to and from Québec, as well as all program activities. This is an excellent and low-cost opportunity for youth to enhance their French skills through immersion. Further information can be found on our website: https://swse.ymcagta.org/
- To ensure a safe exchange for youth and host families, the SWSE team has been continually updating program protocols to adhere to local and national health authority recommendations and guidelines related to COVID-19. Keeping in mind case numbers, vaccination rollouts, and broader risks, we will continue to modify the program as necessary to provide a safe, fun, and impactful experience for all.

The UBC Future Global Leaders program is designed for you. For three weeks, learn from top UBC professors as you delve deeper into your academic interests, and discover what teaching is like at the first-year level at a top-tier university. What can you study?

You can choose from seven engaging academic courses, all taught by UBC instructors. This

Who can take part?

You don't need to provide your scores, and can self-assess your own levels.

What is SOYL?

SOYL is a 6-week summer leadership and empowerment program offered by Fresh Roots in partnership with school districts. We run SOYL in three different locations:

- SOYL @ Vancouver.
- SOYL @ Suwa'lkh (Coquitlam).
- SOYL @ Farm Roots (Delta). Those applicants accepted to SOYL will then be enrolled in Delta School District's Summer School Registration.
- The program empowers secondary students to cultivate and steward schoolyard farms for learning, community building and growing Good Food for All. Through their time with SOYL, youth develop skills in growing, cooking, and selling food, as well as a greater connection to themselves, their community, and the regional food system. Youth also receive a stipend and can receive school credit for their contributions.

Health Care Access Program: Job Opportunity after graduation

COVID-19 has increased the need for additional staff in long-term care and assisted living services. Typically, these positions require prior experience and education. The Health Career Access Program provides a path for applicants with no health care experience to get hired and receive on-the-job training.

How to get your career started

- COVID-19 has increased the need for health care assistants in long-term care and assisted living services.
- Normally, to become a health care assistant, you must complete six to eight months of post-secondary education at your own
 expense before you can apply for a position.
- Through the Health Career Access Program, the Province will pay for your post-secondary education.

New hires in the program start in a health care support worker position and receive paid training that leads to full qualification as a health care assistant.

Please note: All successful program applicants must start as a health care support worker before advancing to a health care assistant position.

Health care support worker

- Health care support workers are supervised by registered nurses or other regulated health care professionals. They provide a
 variety of critical non-clinical, non-direct care supports to patients and residents.
- Typical duties include:
- Participating as an integral member of a healthcare delivery team
- Establishing a caring relationship with clients, residents and families
- Providing support and assistance with mealtime activities
- Providing support and assistance in carrying out activities
- Performing housekeeping duties
- Greeting and directing visitors
- Restocking supplies
- Completing and maintaining relevant records
- Health care support workers earn \$20.95 an hour.


